There was quite a large attend-
ance at the funeral of the late Mrs.

who conducted the funeral services
at the house and grave, made some
very appropriate remarks. A num-
ber of relatives and friends from
neighboring towns were in attend-
ance; among whom were Mr. and
Mrs. J. W. Hobbs, of McMinville,
E. H. Woodworth, editor of the
Newberg Graphic, and his wife and
two lady friends, and J. L. Hoskins.
The grave was profusely decorated
with beautiful flowers, showing the
high esteem in which deceased was
held here, at her late home.

J. W. Coffin, manager of the
C. K. Spanning Co.'s sawmill at
Newberg, while here on a visit to

was being thoroughly over-
hauled and new machinery ad-

capacity of the mill will be en-
