Hon. A. J. Apperson, receiver in the U. S. land office at Sitka, Alaska, appears well pleased with his new environment. In a recent letter to a friend he remarks: "We are enjoying our selves up here in Sitka. What white people we have are of the better class, highly educated and cultured. This is a great, grand unexplored and undeveloped territory, great in area and rich and varied in resources. One-tenth of its vastness or richness has not yet been developed or told in our newspapers. The climate at Sitka is but little different from the Willamette valley possibly more rain, but this is more than compensated for by the invigorating effects got from the salt water."

On Monday last the superintendent of the Oregon State Insane Asylum was transferred from Dr. D. A. Paine to Dr. J. F. Calbreath, of McMinnville, who is now in charge of that institution. This is the second physician from McMinnville chosen to fill the position of superintendent of that institution since its existence. The former referred to was Dr. L. L. Rowland, who at the time of his appointment was a resident of Marion county, Salem. The monthly report of Dr. D. A. Paine for December, with other reports showing that on January 1, 1899, there were in the asylum 1167 patients, 785 of whom were males and 382 were females. January 1900 this number had increased to 1170; an increase of 3 during the year. Since January 1, 1899 there had been 360 patients received, 230 males and 130 females. There were discharged 130 males, and 86 females; 70 males and 56 females died, and 15 males escaped. At the time of the report there were 800 males and 270 females. Whole number of patients receiving treatment at asylum during 1899 was 1527; of these 1015 were males and 512 females. Highest number receiving treatment at one time was 1192, which number was enrolled on the last day of April.

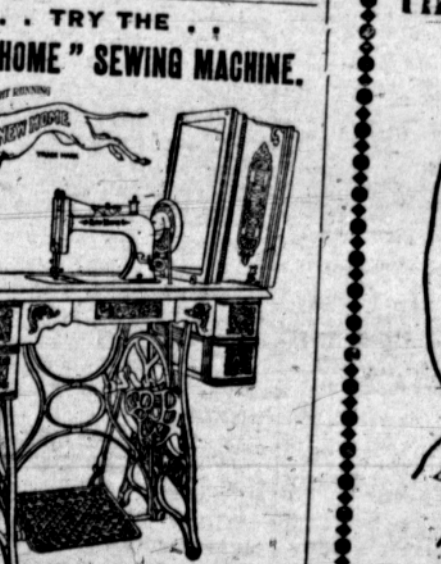
