

Jos. R. Willard, who shot and killed T. D. Perry, on the latter's farm 5 miles south of Salem, about two months since, and who was confined in the Marion county jail at Salem, awaiting trial, hung himself on Saturday morning last to a water pipe in a closet of the jail.

We have received from Secretary of State Wm. H. Dunbar, the Election Laws of the State of Oregon, and of the United States of America, so far as they relate to the conduct of elections and the duties of officers in connection therewith; also other statutes and information relating to elections. The book was compiled and published by Secretary of State Dunbar, and is a useful work, and is very convenient for reference.

J. P. Kennedy, secretary of the State Republican League, calls attention to the fact that the regular biennial meeting of the League will be held in Portland on Tuesday, February 6. In accordance with the provisions of the constitution and by-laws of the League, it is necessary, to entitle a club to representation, that a list of its members be filed with the League Secretary at least 30 days prior to the date of meeting.

The Columbia River and Oregon Timberman is a new publication lately started at Portland, Geo. M. Cornwall publisher; subscription price \$1 per year. The Timberman is published principally in the interest of the lumber and timber trade, although it touches on other public affairs. The number received is filled with much of interest regarding the lumber industry on this coast and elsewhere, and it also contains a number of fine illustrations.

A. A. Dubois and family, who left McMinnville last November for St. John, Kan., returned here on Monday, having concluded to stay by Oregon. It is Mr. Dubois' intention to locate at Albany. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the McMinnville Grange & Farmers Co. held last Saturday was largely attended, and the volume of business transacted during the year just ended was highly satisfactory to the stockholders. In view of this there was no change made in the personnel of directors or managers, the former parties being re-elected.—Reporter.

"LET THERE BE LIGHT."—The story of a Workmen's Club, its search for the cause of poverty and social inequality, its discussions, and its plan for amelioration. This book, which follows somewhat the scheme of Samuel Hays' Friends in Council and of Cicero's Disputations, is notable for its originality, logic, and boldness. The writer of the book, Mr. David Lubin, is by no means unknown to the general public of California; a large employer of labor; a man of high commercial standing, who has an extensive acquaintance with agricultural affairs. In his public life, he is best known as advocating the plan of placing upon agricultural exports an export bounty, to offset, in favor of the farmer, the support to manufacturers given by import duties. This measure, as urged by him, has held the attention of Congress in several sessions, and has attracted notice in this country and in England.

PROMOTED.—George L. Alexander, who for the past 15 months has been manager of the American Type Founders' Company in Portland, has been promoted to the position of manager of the San Francisco house and leaves this evening for his new field. As a token of their esteem, the men who have been working under him here yesterday presented him with a gold watch, suitably engraved, also a gold pen. Mr. Alexander has won the good opinion of all with whom he has come in contact. His successor here is John S. Pinney, who has been employed by the same company in Chicago, Cincinnati and St. Paul, Oregonian.

G. P. Kinyon has sold his interest in the Newberg flouring mill to H. A. Grafe who was one of the number who came here from Minnesota in the fall. H. O. Hanson planted a quarter of an acre in carrots the past season and harvested six and a half tons. He also raised a crop of sugar beets and is now experimenting with both as cow feed to ascertain which produces the best results. Storey, H. H. Winslow, W. C. Woodward. Dr. Harry Littlefield has been here for several days assisting his brother Dr. H. J. in his practice. On Monday they performed a very critical surgical operation on the person of Mrs. Canby Heston of Dundee, the results of which are still in very grave doubt. A gall stone which was giving very serious trouble was removed and while the physicians hope that the patient may be able to withstand the shock and recover from the disease they are aware that they have a very difficult case on their hands.

Dayton Republican League met in Nichols' hall Saturday last for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, and also delegates to attend the State League, which meets in Portland Feb. 6. Preparations are being made by the sheriff of Polk county to hang to W. G. Magers, who was convicted of murdering Raymond Sink near Salem, about two years ago, and throwing the body into the river. The time set for the execution is Friday, Feb. 2. The rope used to hang (laud Branton at Eugene last spring, will be used. A close watch is kept on Magers.
