King L. Hibbard of Salem, a pioneer of 1847, died at his home Tuesday afternoon, aged 62 years.

F. R. Anson, at one time manager of the Salem Light & Traction Co., proposes to build and operate another electric car line in Salem. Providing the city council will grant him right of way on the streets.

There is a prospect that the dried fruit men of Oregon will soon form an association. It is the intention to make the organization a strong and effective one, and to this end, it is understood that a study is being made of the associations of the same kind in California. It is likely that a meeting will be held in Salem soon, to get the matter underway—Oregon Statesman.

Several prominent men of this county have been arrested for riding on bicycle paths, and have pleaded guilty and been fined. It was hoped that the defendants would club together and test the law, but this they decided not to do, their attorney arriving at the conclusion that it would be too expensive to test the constitutionality of the law. So there remains but one thing to do and that is keep off the bicycle paths—Telephone Register.

The crew of the steamer Ruth and a number of the citizens of Corvallis, were most delightfully entertained on board the steamer last Sunday, by Captain Hatch, who is visiting friends in that city. The Captain had on board his large phonograph and symphony, with which he entertained those on board with first class music, also a sermon, delivered by himself. The Captain should be able to deliver a good sermon, having been taught in the right way.

The steamer City of Eugene was libeled for wages on Monday last at Portland, by members of the crew. The amount claimed to be due the employees of the boat is \$1879.74. The United States Marshal took charge of boat Monday morning. Monday's Portland Evening Telegram says: "Libelants pray for a judgment for their wages and ask that the boat be sold to satisfy the claim. The boat will probably be sold under the hammer." The steamer is owned by merchants of Eugene.

The American Federation of Labor at its annual meeting in Detroit, Mich., adopted a resolution asking Congress to submit to the state legislatures a 16 amendment forbidding disfranchisement on account of race. Samuel Gompers, president of the Federation, is an ardent advocate of equal suffrage. We are impressed with the host of men in high positions coming out for woman's equal suffrage. We see the light, and freedom in the near future. R. B. W.

The Salem Choral Society will hold a festival May 9, 10 and 11. The best musical talent of the state will be represented there. Three prominent musicians, have already been secured as soloists: Mrs. Rose Bloch Barst, soprano; J. W. Belcher, tenor; Irving M. Glen, baritone. The latter gentleman, who is a professor in the State University at Eugene, is well and favorably known here and at McMinnville, where he formerly resided. He is a son of Rev. J. Glen of Dayton, and has had musical instruction from some of the best musicians of eastern colleges.

Prof. J. J. Krape, who was assaulted and knocked insensible by some cowardly assailant in Sheridan ten days ago, has nearly recovered from his injuries, and spent the past few days in this city. His son Leo Krape, is teaching for Prof. Krape, at Sheridan, during the latter's absence. The professor had a narrow escape from death, his condition, after the assault upon him, having been considered precarious for several days—Oregon Statesman.

The cause of the assault on Prof. Krape was that he had punished one of his scholars for misconduct. The matter had been taken before a justice of the peace, but the trial did not result in convicting the professor of any offense. It being late at night when the trial ended, and while Mr. Krape was returning to his home he was attacked, it is said, by three men, and brutally beaten.

It is remarkable in this day and age what ridiculous excuses men invent to account for their miserable failures in endeavoring to impress the world with their importance as leaders of reform. It is very noticeable in the church. We have to day a class of men whose business we are told is to preach the gospel for which they are paid by their individual members and the public. The gospel, we understand this to mean a revelation of the grace of God to fallen man, through a mediator, including the whole scheme of salvation as revealed by Christ and his apostles, or, according to the Latin term, Evangelium, a good or joyful message; hence we are constrained to believe that what we have preached to us to day is not that gospel which the great teacher suffered the most cruel and humiliating death to promulgate, but rather a miserable contrivance of selfish and overbearing persons who brow beat and coerce people into the belief that the gospel was invited to regulate the political aspirations and rights of an individual, community, a nation and a world. The Great Teacher when confronted with the same problem answered that His kingdom was not of this world, but that it had to do with interests of the soul of man, which he came to redeem. Therefore, the church and the gospel was intended to meet the spiritual necessities of the soul, not for furthering the schemes of any political party. The doors of the church now appear open to a mixture of religion and politics, which teach that man has no authority to use freedom and opportunities, that are his legal and predestined rights, and that man can fulfill his individuality only by his identification with prohibition party. In this there is no security for liberty; no basis for free individuality. The only ground which man can achieve for himself and the world is through grace of that freedom, which is God given. It is no surprise to the world that interest in religious matters have a retrogressive movement, as expressed by ministers at home. The world is conscious of this, but attribute it not to causes given by those gentlemen; but to conditions that exist in the

church. It is no wonder people take retrospective view of religion and desire the simple belief and experience of their forefathers, when religion and politics were a million miles apart.
