

The Bryan reception at Salem on Wednesday, was a big affair. Quite a large crowd greeted the Hon. W. J. Bryan—the "silvered tongue" orator.

Portland is making great preparations to receive Hon. W. J. Bryan, who speaks in that city April 4, at Exposition auditorium, and who will be tendered a public reception at the Portland Hotel. The railroads and the steamship lines have made a special low rate to excursionists desiring to visit the metropolis on the day of Mr. Bryan's welcome.

About 35 of the Woodmen of the World, last Saturday took their saws, axes and shovels and went to Henry Gabriel's farm to give him a day's work, they cleared about three acres of land besides cutting several cords of wood and building some fence, the boys were somewhat sore the next morning but declared they were going back and put in another day for Nighbor Gabriel in the near future.—Telephone Register.

The Jones mill force will leave for the mountains about the first of April, should the weather remain good. Although lumber has raised in price at neighboring towns from \$1.50 to \$2 per thousand feet, Mr. Adams says that they expect to sell at last year's prices. THE BEET SUGAR FACTORY

Just as our citizens were settling down to the conclusion that all our beet sugar talk had been in vain, a life has been thrown into it by their arrival on last Monday evening of Dr. Karl G. Korn and Thomas N. Case of Dayton, Ohio, and U. Zeitzfuchs of Portland, who said they were here to talk business. Dr. Korn is consulting engineer of the Globe Iron Works, of Dayton and Mr. Case is a civil engineer, while Mr. Zeitzfuchs is the Portland gentleman who was here in the winter.

On Tuesday Jesse Edwards and Clarence Butt drove out with the visitors, showing them the proposed site on the river for the plant and the surrounding country as well.

In the evening a meeting was held at Armory hall, when Dr. Korn stated that the company he represented would put up a beet sugar plant at some point in the Willamette valley, that they had visited a number of other points but they had arrived at the conclusion that Newberg had more favorable advantages than any other point in the valley for such a factory and they were now ready to make a definite proposition to our people. All they ask is a donation of a tract of fifty acres of land for the plant and a five year guarantee of 5000 acres for the growing of beets. Two tracts of land were examined, the B. C. Miles land at the foot of River street, and the land lying between the Edwards brick factory and the river, and while they would rather prefer the Miles land as it is cleared they will accept either.

Dr. Korn gave a very intelligent talk on beet culture and by his willingness and ability to answer the many questions that were put to him he inspired confidence in his hearers. He said in answer to the statement made by Prof. Shaw that the reason was too short in the Willamette valley for successful beet growing, that there were twenty-eight varieties of sugar beets, some maturing in 100 days and he had no fears along that line.

George C. Sears made an earnest speech in which he said these people were not asking anything of us but were simply offering us a big thing if we would take it, and he urged immediate and energetic action. He said that a starch factory would most certainly come with it, as well as other smaller industries.

Everybody present seemed to catch new inspiration and a meeting was arranged for Thursday night when permanent organization will be effected and preparations made for an active canvass in order to meet the conditions.

The plant proposed is to be of 500 tons capacity per day and will cost from \$400,000 to \$500,000. Does anybody know that a company

would invest this amount of capital in a plant that must depend on the farmers for its raw material, unless the company felt sure that it would be profitable to the farmers? Word already comes from Champego, Whiteson and Independence that farmers are anxious to consider a proposition for growing beets. Dr. Korn says the crop can be hauled twelve miles by wagon with profit and shipped by rail fifty miles, and with such a field as can be reached by river and rail the 5000 acres can be secured without doubt by July 1, the time given our people to comply with the conditions.

D. Solis Cohen, of Portland, is named by the company as the attorney who has been empowered to sign contracts and the matter is expected to assume definite shape within a few days.

PROHIBITION CONVENTION.

Pursuant to call the prohibition county convention met at the court house, McMinnville, March 23d, at 11 o'clock a. m. Convention called to order by Rev. A. J. Hunsaker, and opened with prayer by Rev. J. C. Lucas, of West Chehalis.

D. A. Snyder of Dayton, was elected temporary chairman, and M. Votaw, of Newberg, temporary secretary.

Committees were appointed on enrollment, platform and nominations.

On motion temporary officers were made permanent officers of convention.

A committee of one, N. L. Wiley, of Newberg, was appointed to solicit subscriptions for the state paper, The Search Light.

Convention adjourned until 1 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon session.

Convention called to order at 2 p. m.

E. O. Miller state field secretary, addressed the convention on the "Woolly movement," wherein Mr. Woolly offers to deliver one address for each 100 subscribers secured for the New Voice by prohibitionists of this county.

Mr. Miller suggested that at least 200 subscribers could be secured in this county, thus securing Mr. Woolly for two addresses, one at McMinnville and the other at Newberg.

Mr. F. H. Amos the state chairman being present was invited to address the convention, which he did. Mr. Amos' address was both interesting and instructive, and did much to encourage those present, filling them with enthusiasm and zeal for their work.

Immediately after the address of Mr. Amos the committee on platform made its report, which was adopted.

Believing the liquor traffic to be a foe to civilization, the arch enemy of public government and a public nuisance, the citadel of the forces that corrupt politics, promote poverty and crime, degrade the nation's home life, thwart the will of the people and deliver our country into the rapacious class interests, we declare for the entire suppression of the manufacture, sale, exportation, importation and transportation of alcoholic liquors as a beverage, the manufacture and sale of such liquors for medical, scientific and mechanical purposes to be conducted by the government without profit and under strict regulations.

Recommending and declaring the suppression of the liquor traffic to be the dominant issue in national, state and municipal politics, we earnestly plead with all who are in favor of the suppression of the liquor traffic to vote for this principle until the nation is safe from its blighting curse. After which we pledge our selves to aid in the settlement of other great issues that may be before the people.

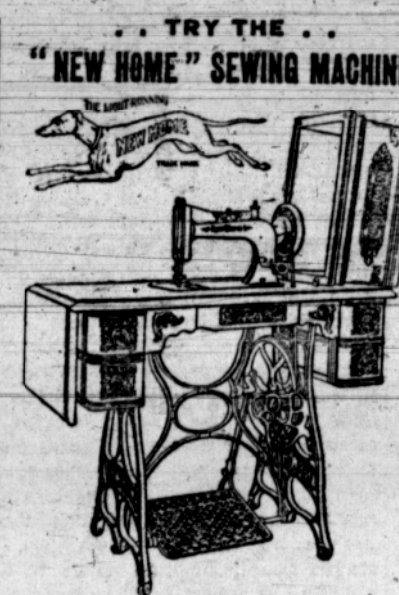
