Sunday, June 3, 1900, at his home

3 mile north of Dayton, John

Gould, of heart disease and dropsy,

aged 69 years.

Deceased was born in Nova Scot-
ia, June 3, 1831. In childhood he
moved to Ohio, and when arrived at
manhood he removed from there to
Laporte county, Indiana. In 1852
he crossed the plains to Oregon and
located in Marion county, near
Champoeg, from there he moved to
the farm in the Red Hills 3 miles
north of Dayton, in 1877, where he
lived until his death. He was a
veteran of the Rogue river war of
1856. Burial in cemetery at Dun-
doe, Monday at 1 o'clock; there was
a large attendance. This is another
pioneer laid to rest.
