

American manufactured goods to the value of \$40,000,000 were shipped to foreign countries last April. That is a record breaker.

The Standard Oil Company's rival has increased its capital to \$10,000,000. This looks like a fight coming between two of the big trusts.

Mrs. Elizabeth Wands of Salem, was elected department president by the ladies of the G. A. R. at their meeting in Eugene last week.

H. B. Thielson, secretary of the Salem chamber of commerce, was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. of Oregon, at the meeting of that body in Portland last week.

Exports from the United States to Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaii, the Philippine and Samoan Islands will reach \$45,000,000 in the fiscal year ending with this month, being three times greater than in 1896. This is good expansion.

John Gault, of Hillsboro, says the Daily Oregon Statesman of Sunday, Jun. 17th, while employed as engineer's helper at the insane asylum, met with a serious accident last evening, while at work in the boiler room. A plug blew out of a steam pipe near where he was at work, and the escaping steam scalded his face and neck. It is believed that in several weeks he will entirely recover from his injuries.

THE DOMESTIC (AT.—The prominent attention lately bestowed upon the domestic art by fashionable society, and the great success of several art shows, have induced Mr. John E. Diehl, the well known authority on domestic animals, to prepare a handy little volume under the above title. THE INDIA FAMINE.

A heartrending cry for bread comes from the famine suffering people of India—where men, women and children are dying by thousands from starvation. Owing to the small amount of rain that has fallen for several years, and none at all this year, no crop was harvested. In a section nearly as large as the United States, 50,000,000 of human beings are starving. The cries of many gaunt and starving women and children can be heard night and day, writes C. B. Newton, Presbyterian missionary at Jalundar. "If you could see the poor hungry creatures, especially the women and children, and could hear their thankful words for even one small meal, I believe you would willingly deny yourselves some luxury or, perhaps, some comfort that some poor, starving child might have food."—Mrs. J. C. Lawson, American Methodist Missionary at Aligarh. On all the roads in West India crowds of gaunt, hungry men are struggling along toward the relief camps, and in the rear are women scarcely able to walk, plodding along, hoping to reach relief before their strength utterly fails. But the most pitiful sight of all is the children in the crowd. Occasionally a mother too weak to pursue the journey for bread, lies down to die, and her child will be found watching by the corpse, expecting the mother to awaken from her sleep. The Indian government now employs five millions of the sufferers on relief works at an average pay of 2 cents a day—just enough to sustain life. All others are dependent on private charity, and unless their cry for food is speedily heard and promptly answered, millions must miserably die the lingering, tortuous death of slow starvation.

Dr. Klopach who has just completed a tour of the famine districts in Bombay Presidency, including the native states of Gujarat and Baroda, found everywhere shocking and revolting scenes. At Godhra, about 300 miles north of Bombay, in Gujarat district, there were 3,000 deaths from cholera in four days. The districts to be seen on every side is heartrending, but it is feared that the worst is yet to come, when the monsoon breaks and the torrential rains flood the relief camps and a large part of the famine area, spreading disease, and especially cholera.

This neighborhood will have to administer a little bit of "frontier justice" as an effective bar to further procedure along that line, if the guilty person can be detected. Our citizens had their attention called during the week to the advisability of graveling the road leading from McMinnville to Dayton, and they subscribed quite liberally to fund for that purpose.
