Such fruit is only produced by careful and thorough cultivation. Mr. Moench does his cultivating in an intelligent and thorough way. This is shown by growing crops on his place. To illustrate, he has corn growing that is now over 9 feet in height.

R. Miller, who was on his way to Albany, and J. E. Mellinger, who was going to Salem to attend the A. O. U. W. grand lodge at Salem, and the writer, were passengers on board the steamer Modoc on the trip up to Salem Monday. When arriving at Lambert's the steamer made a stop of several hours on the gravel bar in order, it was presumed to give the passengers an opportunity to view the scenery at that place, and permit a portion of the crew to take a wade in the clear water, and then line the boat over the bar. On arriving at Lincoln at dusk, the boat was tied up for the night. A new patent wheel having been attached to the boat, Captain Gordon did not wish to take any chances at Rice's bar after night. About 4 o'clock next morning the steamer started for Salem, and arrived in that city shortly after five, leaving at 6:30 the usual hour. The passengers—ladies and gentlemen—among who were Mr. and Mrs. Nune of Portland, the former being employed on Oregonian—made the best of the situation, although some who were going to Corvallis and Albany were disappointed by not making connection at Salem with night train. Doc Mellinger and R. Miller who took "first boat" with reporter, was the "life of the party, and aided in while away the time.

JULY TERM.
Official board of county officers approved as follows:

J. H. Nelson, clerk, \$10,000; J. L. Hoskins, recorder, \$3,000; F. W. Sitton, sheriff, \$10,000; C. Branson, surveyor, \$5,000; O. O. Rhoads, treasurer, \$20,000.

Appointment of W. C. Haggerty as deputy sheriff, J. O. Rogers as deputy recorder and Ira G. Nelson as deputy clerk, approved.

Sheriff's bond for \$10,000 as tax collector, approved.

Road petitioned for by C. Mitchell and 50 others ordered viewed by viewers appointed at the June term, having failed to meet. Viewers to meet July 20th, with H. S. Maloney and view said road.

Official bond of J. M. Chapman, coroner, approved.

Four wildcat scalps compared with certificates and bounty allowed.

O. O. Hodson, Rasmus Nelson and Ivan Daniel appointed to assess damages on road petitioned for by John Berry et al, to meet July 13, and report first day of August term.

Rates fixed on Big Nestucca toll road for ensuing year as follows: One horse vehicle 3c per mile, two horse vehicle 6c per mile, four horse vehicle 8c per mile, saddle and pack horse each 24c per mile, loose cattle or horses 14c per mile, sheep and hogs 4c per mile, bicycle 1c per mile.
