There has been a material change made in the premium list for the Oregon State Fair in relation to fruits. Heretofore there has been a first premium of one dollar and a second premium of fifty cents on each variety, not less than ten specimens being required of each. This year the premiums are as follows:

Best display of fall apples, not less than ten plates, first premium \$10, and second premium of \$5.

Best display winter apples, not less than ten plates, first premium \$10, second premium \$5.

Best display pears, not less than ten plates, first premium \$10, second \$5.

Best display fresh prunes, not less than ten pounds, first premium \$10, second premium \$5.

Best display plums, not less than ten pounds, first premium \$10, second \$5.

Best display Oregon grown nuts, not less than one quart of each variety, first premium \$10, second premium \$5.

Best display quinces, not less than one peck, first premium \$5, second \$1.

For each variety of grapes, first premium \$1; second 50 cents.

Best display Oregon grown grapes, not less than five bunches of each variety, first premium \$5; second premium \$2.50.

Largest and best exhibit of machine dried fruits, ten specimens of not less than ten pounds each, first premium of \$20; second premium \$10.

Articles in this division must be made (grown) and prepared by the exhibitor only.

The superintendent of the pavilion is instructed to reject all infected fruit for exhibition.

The Oregon Daily Statesman of August 11 says: "During the last five days the local creamery quotation for butter fat has advanced 44 cents. The price now being paid by the Salem creamery Company is as follows: Butter fat delivered at creamery, 22 1/2 cents for separator cream, 20 cents a pound for hand skimmed. When collected at the farm house by the creamery wagon, but 20 1/2 cents is paid for the former and 18 cents for the latter. Manager Geo. D. Goodhue says he expects a further rise of from two to three cents per pound in the price of butter fat within the next ten days. There is danger, however, that if the price of butter goes too high, the importation of the Eastern product will be invited. This can be avoided by putting on the market cold storage butter, of which there are vast quantities. By this means the supply can be made adequate to the demand without necessitating the shipping to Oregon any Eastern butter. How high the market price for butter can go before endangering the supplying of the local market with imported butter depends entirely upon the price of Eastern butter. At the present time, the Oregon farmer is receiving nearly 4 cents per pound more for his butter than the Eastern farmer, so it will be seen that the price for butter fat at the Salem institutions cannot go much higher before Eastern speculators will find it profitable to engage in shipping butter to the coast and placing it on the market in competition with the Oregon product."

Why not place the cold storage surplus of butter on the market at once, and keep out Eastern competition. This coast is now and always

has been laboring under a disadvantage, because of having to pay tribute to the East on machinery, wagons, carriages and other articles that properly and by right should have been manufactured here. It is easy for Eastern people when visiting this coast to criticize and comment on the absence of manufactures. One, and the main reason why there are not more factories here is that Eastern capitalists find it more profitable to invest their capital, and operate factories where labor is cheap and they can operate at the least cost. It matters not to them what the freight charges are, so long as the purchaser pays them. And of course the transportation companies do not refuse or object to carrying the machinery and manufactured products when they are paid for doing so. Keep out Eastern butter competition. Start more creameries, and manufacturers of all kind, and give them such support as will keep them running. Dayton needs a good creamery; it would be a good investment for any man or company to start one and keep it running.
