Joseph Odell at Pleasantdale, Wednesday, September 19th, aged 73 years, 6 mos, 29 days. The funeral will be held Friday (to-day) at 10 a. m. in the church at Pleasantdale; burial thereafter at the Odell cemetery.

After several days' illness at the home of his son, Galen C. Miller, father M. Miller, aged 82 years, less two weeks. The funeral will take place at Hopewell on Friday, (to-day) at 2 p. m. Services will be conducted by Rev. J. Bowersox.
