From the reports of the different city officials to the council we note that the financial condition of the city is good. This is gratifying to all who are in any way interested in the welfare of the city. We are pleased to note this fact. But why should the publisher of HERALD be informed, as he has been heretofore, by city officials, who should have known the financial condition of the city, that there was no funds in the hands of the city, and it was not known when there would be. The same statement was given the publisher by others outside of the city council. If you don't want to be misrepresented give the facts.

The world has never known a more dramatic situation than that presented by the foreign community within the walls of Peking, while cut off from communication with their countrymen. During these long, doubtful weeks, the most interesting figure in this international tragedy was Sir Robert Hart, who, for more than 25 years has been as far as a European might, the statesman guiding the affairs of the Chinese Empire. On the 17th of October, the following cable message from Sir Robert's London representative to the editor of the Cosmopolitan was received: "Sir Robert Hart has sent for November number. Forthrightly, London, and Cosmopolitan, New York, an important article on siege of Peking, about 15,000 words, which I will post you to-morrow." The MS arrived in time to be included in the December issue. The Cosmopolitan has been highly honored by Sir Robert Hart.

The following resolutions were adopted by the National Irrigation Congress, November 24, 1900, at its late session in Chicago:

"We hail with satisfaction the fact that both of the great political parties of the nation in the last campaign declared in favor of the reclamation of arid America, in order that settlers might build homes on the public domain, and to that end we urge upon Congress that national appropriations commensurate with the magnitude of the problem should be made for the preservation of the forests and the reforestation of denuded areas as natural storage reservoirs and for the construction by the national government as part of its policy of internal improvement of storage reservoirs and other works for flood protection, and to save for use in aid of navigation and irrigation, the waters which now run to waste, and for the development of artesian and subterranean sources of water supply.

The waters of all streams should forever remain subject to public control and the right of the use of water for irrigation should inhere in the land irrigated, and beneficial use be the basis of measure and the limit of the right.

"The work of building the reservoirs necessary to store floods should be done directly by the government under existing statutes relating to the employment of labor and hours of work, and under laws that will give to all American citizens a free and equal opportunity to get first employment, and then a home on the land.

"We commend the efficient work of the various bureaus of the national government in the investigation of the physical and legal problems, and other conditions relating to irrigation and in promoting the adoption of more effective laws, customs and methods of irrigated agriculture, and urge upon congress the necessity of providing liberal appropriations for this important work.
