C. A. Overbaugh, traveling freight agent for the O. R. & N. Co. came down from Dallas on Tuesday and transacted business here for the company that evening. He left next morning on steamer Elmore on his way to Portland.

On Tuesday the steamer Elmore brought up from Portland, 500 sacks of wheat for the Dayton Flour Mill. This was the first shipment of 5000 bushels of wheat purchased at Portland by S. W. Iler, proprietor of Dayton Flour Mill. The order of things is reversed in this instance, heretofore wheat has always been purchased in the country for milling purposes. Now, it appears that wheat has to be bought in the city; the supply having run short in the country.

When Hagey was turning his horse to go back, Feeks jumped from the buggy, on the opposite side from Turner, and ran into the brush, and made his escape.

A telephone message received from Mehana on Friday night at the Oregon Statesman office, Salem, conveyed the information that at 11:58 a. m. Friday, a severe earthquake shock was felt at that place, last nearly two minutes. Windows rattled and small articles on shelves and tables were moved and in some cases fell to the floor. The movement seemed to be from east to west. No great damage done, but residents somewhat excited, and a number of them alarmed.

On Monday the steamer Bonita attempted to run up over the dam at the Yamhill locks, the water being too high to pass through the locks. When about half way over the large rope by which the boat was being lined up broke, the current being too strong for the rope to hold the boat. When the rope broke the boat swung around and the bow caught on the wall of the locks and hung fast. It was some little time before the boat got free. It then steamed back to Dayton and lay over night.

There will be a Christmas entertainment at the M. E. church, North Yamhill, Monday evening. The Sunday-school will give something out of the ordinary line. The program as arranged will be very interesting. Rev. Leech of Salem, the pastor of the church will be there, and with his little son will take an active part in the entertainment.

T. A. Lewis and son of Turner, Marion county, brother of Mrs. Robt. Earl, are here visiting. Mr. Lewis who is a shoemaker, and who has been employed in the shoemaking department at State Reform School near Salem, is looking at Dayton with a view of locating and opening a shoe shop here.

A man in McMinnville made an unsuccessful attempt to blow the top of his head off with a gun this week. His face was badly lacerated. Wednesday morning his house near the water works, was burned.

Hon. John T. Gowdy is out with a petition for Dayton postoffice, and is said to stand a mighty good show of getting it. He is one of the best old men in the county, and probably no one in Dayton or vicinity is as worthy of an official favor of that kind.—Yamhill County Reporter.
