Few persons have any idea of the enormous amount of mail received during the holiday season of the year by so large a house as The Curtis Publishing Company of Philadelphia, which publishes The Ladies' Home Journal and The Saturday Evening Post. With this company the month of December usually brings the heaviest daily mail, and on a Thursday last December all previous records were broken. On that day the actual number of letters received was 9080. These contained 16,177 subscriptions to the two periodicals mentioned, and \$16,498.44 in express and money orders and in cash. To open, receipt for, tabulate and file these letters, and acknowledge each one separately, requires the work of a small army of young women, who, needless to say, have no time to spare.

An effort is being made to have Crater Lake, in Southern Oregon, set aside as a National Park. Hon. Thos. H. Tongue has introduced a bill in Congress for that purpose. The Oregon delegation in Congress, and Mr. Tongue should receive the hearty support of the people of this state, and demand that Congress speedily take such action as will insure passage of a bill making Crater Lake and the adjoining territory a National Park. Petitions to this effect are being circulated throughout the state. All persons interested and who are willing to circulate petitions, will be supplied with necessary printed matter, by addressing Will G. Steel, Portland, Or. Whatever is done towards having Crater Lake set aside for a National Park, should be done thoroughly and quickly.

Crater Lake is located on the summit of Cascade mountains, Klamath County, Oregon, and is one of the greatest natural wonders of the world. It is a portion of the unappropriated vacant domain of the Government. The surface of the lake is 6,239 feet above sea level, it is nearly six miles in diameter and is completely surrounded by nearly perpendicular walls from 1,000 to 2,000 feet high. It contains a circular island, or cinder cone, 845 feet high, in the top of which is an extinct crater 90 feet deep. The water is clear as crystal, 2,000 feet deep and of the richest possible blue. Adjoining the lake and guarding its approaches the mountains are rugged, of great altitude and of no value for agriculture or mining.

R. B. Miller, General Freight and Passenger Agent of the Southern Pacific Company, at Portland appears to be a man who understands and takes in the condition of things in Oregon, and is doing work that should, and no doubt will make many friends among the farmers and business men of this state, and tend to produce a more cordial and harmonious feeling between the people and the railroad company. He keeps himself well posted on the industries of the state, and personally investigates the conditions on the farm and towns and cities. By his interest in the Farmers' Congress lately held in Salem, a new impetus has been given to the fruit industry in the Willamette Valley, and great quantities of strawberries will be planted in the vicinity of Salem next spring. Mr. Miller is now issuing monthly bulletins giving a list of products that may be had at the various points along the line of the Southern Pacific, the name of the producer, the amount of produce available and the approximate selling price of the same. All agents of the Southern Pacific are requested to send monthly lists of marketable products that can be obtained at their stations, names of producers or sellers and asking prices. The Evening Telegram of Portland, of late date, mentions where Milo L. Rowell, of Fresno, Cal., who sent one of the bulletins, and who wanted potatoes and onions for the California market, went to the producers and bought. He paid from 90 cents to \$1.15 a hundred for potatoes, and from \$1.50 to \$1.75 for onions. The produce he bought at Whittier, Cornelius, Woodburn and Mount Angel. The Southern Pacific and O. R. & N. Companies, appear to be fully taking in the situation, that what is a benefit to the sections of country through which their lines run, and the people therein, is also beneficial to the companies. The O. R. & N. is doing good work in developing Eastern Oregon. If harmony and

a certain extent, a community of interests be built up between the railroad companies and the people, would result in good to each one and better feeling to each other. If Western and Coast Railroad Companies could see it possible to make a slight reduction in freight and passenger rates, of their own accord, they would make many friends, and perhaps, lose nothing in the "long haul." The action taken by a number of companies in raising the wages of train employees, and not giving employment to those using intoxicating liquors is to be commended.
