When railroad companies and secret societies place the ban on the use of intoxicating drinks, which they are now doing, the glorious day that all good temperance people are earnestly working and praying for, when the blighting curse to mankind caused by the use of strong and intoxicating drinks may brightly dawn in the very near future. Many of the railroad companies prohibit the use of strong drinks by their employees. It is to be hoped that all companies, railroads and others, will make the same rule, and strictly enforce it, whether employees are on or off duty. It may be said that can't be done. Why not? An employer has the right to demand the best service of the employed, and when an individual impairs his mental faculties and physical abilities by the indulgence in strong and intoxicating drinks, whether on duty or off, the employer has a right to demand that the employee discontinue its use or be discharged. It is often the plea of those committing crime, that they were drunk or under the influence of liquor; a poor plea for the perpetration of a crime; and how very weak where many lives have been lost in railroad wrecks or steamboat disasters, caused by the use of liquor of those in control. The secret orders, A. O. U. W., W. of W., I. O. O. F., and others, will not admit to membership saloonkeepers or those addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors. The Sovereign Grand Lodge of Old Fellows, in their session at Indianapolis, in October, 1901, decided that the ineligibility of saloonkeepers to membership ap pplies also to hotelkeepers who maintain a bar in connection with their establishments.
