found in this section, on north side
of the Yamhill river.

The Memorial Day exercises Fri-
day, by the G. A. R. and W. R. C.
were interesting and appropriate.
The address by Rev. J. Waggoner,
in which he spoke of the old sol-
diers of the civil war, who saved
our country in its hour of peril, as
deserving of greatest respect, espe-
cially from the young. The address
was of great interest. S. W. Sigler
presided over the meeting at park.
The choir rendered excellent music.
There was a good attendance at all
the exercises, which were conduct-
ed in befitting manner, in honor of
departed comrades.

The freight train from Portland
Wednesday noon, on the Yamhill
Division of Southern Pacific rail-
road was thrown off the track just
west of the West Dayton depot—
7 cars were derailed. The evening
passenger train from Portland was
unable to go farther than West Day-
ton, where it remained over night,
and returned to Portland next
morning. The cars thrown off track
were loaded with lumber, and the
track was not cleared of the wreck-
age until next day, when trains
were able to pass and run on sched-
ule time. The cause of the accident
it is said, was defective and broken
ties. New ties and more ballast
on the track would greatly improve
the Yamhill Division, and make it
much safer for the lives of those
