this week.

The government has a force at
work at the mouth of the Yamhill
river, improving the channel.

Wednesday and Thursday were
the hottest days of the season.
On Wednesday the thermometer
is reported to have stood as high
as 104 degrees.

A force of men in the employ of
the government, is at work putting
in a wing dam at Candiana bar in
the Willamette river, just below
Weston. Several Dayton men are
employed on the work.

wheel Sunday. He expects to have
his threshing machine running this
week.

rious farmers of North Yamhill.

B. Gabriel has leased the La-
fayette warehouse. He is pre-
pared to furnish sacks and store
grain on reasonable terms. He

brother, of Portland, came up to
Dayton Saturday. Mr. Ponnay
and sons went up to the coast range
to take a look over his mountain
ranch. They are guests of J. E.
Mellinger.

The United Evangelical church
building of this place will likely be
moved next week to the lot pur-
chased by the congregation of A.
Detmering, adjoining John Jones'
residence property, near two blocks
northwest of the present location
of the church.

The Dayton Evaporating Co.'s
warehouse and office building has
been raised up, and the basement
is being fitted up for a packing
room. A cable will be run from
the engine in the main building to
the warerooms, to be used in hoist-
ing goods from lower to upper sto-
ries, and for other purpose. The
company are getting in good shape
for a big run of business.

The boats on the upper Willam-
ette are having a hard time in mak-
ing their regular trips. The O. R.
& N. steamer Ruth having stuck
fast on a gravel bar last Friday on
her way to Salem, and being unable
to reach her destination that day,
returned to Portland, and has been
taken off the run from Portland to
Salem. The only boats on that
run now is the Altona and Pionera.
The latter named boat draws much
less water than the other boats, and
is making good time. The Altona
has a hard time to make trips.

Thirty three years Mr. Amby
was going to make a manufacturing
town of McMinnville. He dug a
ditch from Willamina to Sheridan.
The old citizens of McMinnville
are still mad because he tried to do
such a thing. If this generation
has energy enough to complete the
ditch, it will give McMinnville
from 700 to 800 horse power. So
it is stated by those who appear to
know. This certainly would be a
good thing for the county seat.

Last Saturday night the McMinn-
ville News office was destroyed by
fire, and also the McMinnville fence
works. The building in which the
printing office and fence works were
located, was a frame one, and was
burned to the ground. It was in
the rear of building occupied by
the Miller Mercantile Company,
which, fortunately, was a brick
building. Had it been frame it
undoubtedly would have also been
burned. The bowling alley which
was in the rear of the printing
office, was burned, and several cords
of wood in Elsie Wright's wood
yard. A job press and most of the
type in the News office was saved.
But little of the fence work ma-
terial was saved. The printing office
was insured for \$2,000. The fence
works was also insured.

Rev. A. L. Platt announced from
his pulpit last Sunday evening that
he would tender his resignation as
pastor of the Christian church next
Sunday evening, to take effect at
close of the year, October 1st. He
contemplates a visit to Honolulu,
and afterwards locating in Califor-
nia. Six weeks ago Mrs. Chas.
Maclean accidentally ran a needle
in her hand while brushing off a
center table. On Wednesday by
hard pressure it was forced out,
and proved to be the eye end and
three-quarters of an inch in length.

The premium list of the Ore-
gon State Fair is now out. The
managers of the fair are arrang-
ing to have a finer exhibit this
season than in any former year,
and the prospect is favorable of
their doing so. To show that
the Oregon State Fair is attract-
ing attention abroad, and greater
interest is being taken in it, we
publish the following item:
"John Sparks of Reno, Nevada,
will not show at the California
State Fair this year, preferring
to show at the Oregon State Fair
instead. He has one of the
finest herds of Herford cattle in
the United States and will ex-
hibit 20 head at the fair this
fall."

died at his home in Newberg, Sun-
day, August 3d. He was born in
Mackinaw, Tazewell county, Illinois,
October 2, 1858. He came to Ore-
gon with his parents in 1871, and
resided in Yamhill county since
that time. He was a member of
the Masons, Woodmen, Artisans
and the Knights and Ladies of
Society. The funeral was held
Monday afternoon.

Mr. Gilbert's place on the Modoc.
