The Pomona on her trip up to Salem Monday had on board a good lot of passengers and a quantity of freight, and took on board that left by Leone, making Salem shortly after 10 at night.

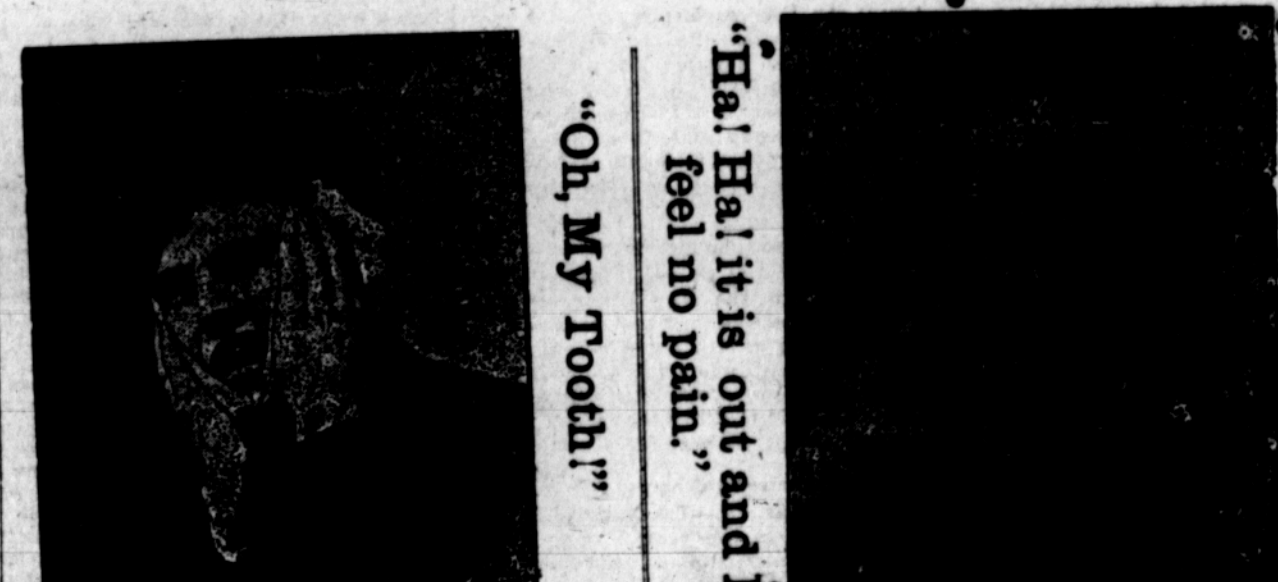
