The coast range was covered
with a heavy coat of snow the first
of the week.

Thursday morning was coldest
of the season. The ground was
frozen quite solid.

Weather moderated and the usual
precipitation, which occurs at this
time of year, of Oregon mist.

The latter part of last week L.

M. at the Dayton postoffice. Post-
master Detmering had an attack of
grippe, and for several days was
unable to attend to business.

The train from Portland Monday
evening was delayed about five
hours. The cause of the delay was
a freight train off the track near
Owego. The passenger train ar-
rived up here after 11 o'clock that
night.

The mails which have been de-
layed of late by snow blockades
and washouts, in different parts of
the country, began to arrive here on
Monday, which caused a busy time
for the Dayton postmaster at time
of arrival of mail.

Mrs. Angie A. Belk left here for
her home in Boise, Idaho, Thurs-
day morning, accompanied by her
father C. W. Powell, who will visit
with her for a couple of months.
Mr. and Mrs. D. Hadley will have
charge of Mr. Powell's store during
his absence.

The people of Lafayette and Mc-
Minnville, feel quite confident that
they will secure the construction of
the spur of the S. P. R. R. from
Lafayette to St. Joe. Mr. Kohler
who was up looking over the route
of the proposed cut off, for the rail-
road company last week, is said to
have spoken favorably of the project.

The people of McMinnville are
agitating the question of changing
the name of that city. This could
be done, and if a short, pretty and
easily pronounced name were chosen,
there would be but few who would
regret the change. J. C. Cooper of
that city, has the matter in hand,
and it is hoped that he will succeed
in having the name changed.

There seems to be a growing de-
mand by residents of the towns
along the line, and country tributary
to the Yamhill division of the S. P.
R. that two passenger trains a
day be run over the road each way,
as it would make it much more
convenient for the public. It is
claimed that there would be much
more travel over the road were two
daily trains run.

J. W. Carey is papering and
painting the inside of the house,
which Mrs. Cahill lately purchased
of Mr. Howe in Macy's addition.
Mrs. Cahill was one of those who
unfortunately had freight on the
Steamer Elmore when that boat
sunk last week; her household
goods were shipped on that boat at
Portland, and with other freight,
went down with the boat.

McMinnville business men have
become convinced of the utter
worthlessness of Yamhill locks as a
means of affording transportation
to and from that city. They also,
from the miserable condition of the
roads leading into that city in the
winter, recognize the fact that they
must have better facilities for trans-
portation. We are informed that
they are planning to build a motor
line to Dayton. It is said that R.
Jacobson of the mercantile firm of
R. Jacobson & Co. is the leader of
the enterprise, if this is so, and Mr.
Jacobson has fully determined to
push the enterprise, it is a go. A
motor line to the county seat is
what HERALD has advocated for
years.

HE LIKES THE WEST.—The fol-
lowing regarding two citizens of
Dayton, who are visiting their old
homes in the East, we take from
the Daily Journal of Flint, Mich-
igan: "R. M. Woolworth and wife,
formerly of Thetford, but who are
now residents of Dayton, Oregon,
have been visiting relatives and old
friends here the past two weeks.
They left Flint this morning and
will visit relatives in Willamston
before returning to their home in
the West. To the Journal this
morning Mr. Woolworth talked of
conditions in Oregon and compared
them with those of Michigan. He
has 30 acres of land near Dayton
and has been in the west about 17
years. Most of his land is under
cultivation for hops and he says the
profits are very satisfactory. Like
most western men Mr. Woolworth
"boasts" the "wild and woolly,"
and says there's no place like it for
health, prosperity and happiness.

STEAMER ELMORE SUNK

The O. R. & N. steamer Elmore
on the way up from Portland,
Saturday was sunk in the Yam-
hill river. When within about
2 of a mile of Dayton—Pike Pole
Bend—where the river makes a
short turn from east to north—the
boat struck a hidden snag which
had never been observed before.
A large hole was torn in the hull
of the Elmore, and she sunk in
about 12 feet of water. The boat
swung around to the west shore
and was made secure, when the
furniture and fixtures on the boat
and a portion of the cargo was
taken ashore, in a more or less
damaged condition. Nichols and
Gabriel of this city had on board
a shipment of merchandise, that
was considerably damaged. The
greater portion of the cargo was
lumber from the C. K. Spaulding
Co.'s mill at Newberg, which re-
mains in the boat. Sunday morn-
ing Captain Gordon, went to
Portland in a small boat, and
that evening the steamer Ruth
arrived up with a scow, and on
Monday brought up another one.
On Tuesday, while arranging to
raise the sunken steamer, the
bow of which was resting on the
bank, with stern in the stream,
with water to the hurricane deck.
The boat being in such position
that spaws could not be placed
in proper position to accomplish
work desired. It was thought
best to change position of sun-
ken vessel. The water being high
with a strong current, when a
line was attached from the Ruth
to Elmore, and the former boat
put on steam, the Elmore floated
and breaking loose from the
lines holding her, went on
down stream about 3 miles, land-
ing on her side against bank of
river, a short distance below R.
N. Snell's. Those who have the
work in hand say that they will
have the Elmore up and afloat
within a short time.
