LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR NOTES.

At the regular meeting of the Lewis and Clark State Commission, held August 8th, the permanent superintendents of several of the departments, to prepare exhibits for St. Louis, were elected. J. R. Douglas, of Albany, was elected superintendent of the agricultural exhibit; J. D. Olwell, of Central Point, superintendent of the horticultural exhibit; M. D. Wisdom, of Portland, superintendent of the live stock exhibit; Fred R. Mellis, of Baker City, superintendent of the mining exhibit; Hon. George T. Myers, of Portland, superintendent of the fisheries exhibit; Prof. H. S. Lyman, of Astoria, superintendent of the educational exhibit, and E. P. Sheldon, of Portland, superintendent of the forestry exhibit.

Hon. Geo. T. Myers, the superintendent of the fisheries exhibit has made his report on space. He says it will be impossible to keep tanks with live salmon, trout and other native fishes in them at St. Louis. He contemplates keeping a hatchery in the space he requires, showing the egg and the little salmon after it is able to take care of itself. Mr. Myers took to Chicago an 83 pound salmon, frozen in a block of ice, but the ice melted so rapidly that it was on exhibition for only a few days, and its keeping and transportation cost nearly \$1300. It will be better to preserve salmon in alcohol, or stuff them.

The State Commission receives some curious offers of oddities to be used at the fair. Some weeks ago a fir tree, 400 feet high and not over 36 inches in diameter at the base, was reported, and a la or, another tree, one half of which was petrified and the other half still tree, was offered to the commission. These seem a little out of the common, but Oregon produces such wonderful things that, in all probability, the commission will have these things investigated to see if they are what is claimed for them.
