

DAYTON OREGON.

Inquire from different sources have been made as to the location of Dayton; the resources of town and country.

Dayton is a thriving little city of 1000 inhabitants; located in the northeastern part of Yamhill county and at the head of navigation on the Yamhill river, on which daily boats run to and from Portland and Ogon City. The Yamhill Division of the Southern Pacific also affords a daily communication north and south to Dallas and Falls City in Polk county, and west to Sheridan. Connection is also made with the West side branch of S. P. R. by stage twice a day; this affording those who desire an opportunity to go to Portland, Hillsboro, and other way points north; or south to Independence, Corvallis, Albany or Yaquina Bay. The Willamette river—on which daily boats run north and south—can be reached within two miles, and passage can be secured to Oregon City and Portland; and south to Salem, at which place one can take the East Side line of S. P., to points either north or south.

Dayton is surrounded with as beautiful and as good an agricultural section of country as will be found in the state of Oregon, or any other state. The soil is rich and adapted to the successful production of all varieties of farm products. The town is surrounded by a thrifty and prosperous farming community, most of whom own the land which they till, and which the few who wish to sell, ask from \$40 to \$60 an acre for land that is cleared and in good cultivation. Timber and brush land from \$20 and up.

Those who have a perfect knowledge of raising fruit will find this locality well adapted to that industry. An experienced fruit grower, who applies himself to raising fruit, and studying the conditions to be successful, can make money in that business alone. He can, if he so desires, find a market right here for a portion of his crop. In making shipments to other markets, he can ship by either rail or boat. As fine fruit can be raised here, by proper care and cultivation, as in any locality. The raising of English Walnuts is another industry that can be made successful and profitable. And it is claimed by those who have raised and marketed this variety of nut that the quality of those raised here is superior to those raised in California and elsewhere.

Dairying can be made very successful here by experienced dairymen, with a knowledge of that business. And with the advantages possessed here of making shipments could be made very profitable. The creamery business could also be made profitable by a thoroughly experienced creameryman, and who has a general knowledge of successful business methods, and who would apply them, and give close and strict attention to that line of business.

The raising of hops is another very profitable business in this vicinity. And a great many are now engaged in raising hops with profit to themselves. It is a generally conceded fact that there is no better hops than those raised in this vicinity.

There is some good timber that could be used in the manufacture of lumber near here, but the amount is limited. Any party having the capital to put in a first class planing-mill and sash and door factory, can get the best of timber for lumber in the coast range of mountains and run it down the Yamhill river to this place, where it could be worked up into lumber. A sash and door factory and planing mill, conducted by one who has the capital, and a thorough knowledge of the business, and energy and push, would undoubtedly return a good profit to one who invested capital in such an enterprise.

A woolen mill, with the necessary capital invested to run it in a proper and business-like manner, would be a money maker to capitalists who invested sufficient capital to run the mills properly to supply the markets with their product. This section is well adapted to raising sheep and goats, and there are many such animals now raised here. The writer claims to have a good knowledge of the states of Oregon and Washington, and feels confident that there is not a better location for woolen mills, in either one of the states than right here at Dayton. This town being only 30 miles from Portland, the metropolis of Oregon, and which can be reached by rail or steamer, making it possible to make quick shipments of the manufactured products. Dayton is only 22 miles from Salem, the capital, which can be reached by steamer.

A cannery is another much needed addition to the business of Dayton. Fruits of all kind—large and small—can be raised here in abundance, and of the best quality. Every variety of vegetables and garden products can be raised, to perfection, and would be should a cannery be established and operated here. It has been demonstrated that the best quality of tobacco can be raised here—on bottom land. Particular—one of whom assisted in raising a crop of tobacco at Wheatland last year, which has been pronounced by experts, as of the best quality—are to put in 20 acres of tobacco this year.

The above mentioned are some of

the opportunities for the profitable investment of capital in this community.
