SAN DIEGO TOURMALINE.

San Diego mines produce the finest tourmaline in the world, and they are, perhaps, the best known and most beautiful of all this galaxy of jewels.

This exquisite gem is found in almost every color and combination of colors, perhaps the most popular being the rubellite, which includes every shade of pink and red; then there is the green or chrysoberite as it is called; indicolite, for the blue, and all the varying combinations of color.

The tourmaline crystals are remarkable for their varied and beautiful groupings of colors. Some are internally blue or brown, surrounded by a bright carmine red, or dull yellow; others are red internally, enveloped by a green exterior; crystals are sometimes pink at the summit and green at the base, or crimson, tipped with black or white shading to green, and then to red.

No gem enjoys such a suit of colors as the tourmaline. The finest specimens of this gem are found in San Diego county, in the famous Mesa Grande mountains.

THE COMMERCE AT HAND.

It is always well to look facts in the face. Here are a few significant ones. Advance sheets from the annual report of the chief of statistics in Washington show that the "world's swappings" last year amounted to a little over \$22,000,000,000 in value.

Of this sum \$6,498,000,000 in exports and \$8,301,000,000 in imports, amounting, in round figures, to two thirds of the world's entire foreign trade.

The foreign trade of the United States, on the other hand, is put down with \$1,590,050,000 in exports and \$870,082,000 in imports. The fact that the share of the United States is not larger may astonish many; but the seeming paradox is easily susceptible of explanation.

Until recently we have had no need of a large foreign commerce, our home market amounting to day to over \$20,000,000,000, or nearly the world's entire foreign trade, and our foreign trade is but one-thirtieth of our home trade, whereas Britain's foreign trade is one half of her whole, and Germany's is over one-third. That is the simple explanation.—The Pacific Monthly for October.

Jessie Garwood, in her talks on silver, describes some of the larger table accessories made of the precious metal.

O. P. Hoff, of Salem, State Commissioner of Labor and Factory Inspector, was here last week inspecting the running machinery of the different plants in this city, as to their safety against accident to employers and employees. In the Dayton Evaporator Company's plant he recommended that the main shaft be covered. Mr. Hoff is certainly doing a good work in showing owners of factories and manufacturing plants the real necessity and benefit to them of having machinery protected so that no accidents are liable to occur while the machinery is in operation. He is not arbitrary in his demands to enforce the law; but he endeavors to point out the danger where certain parts of the machinery are exposed, and convince owners of the benefit to them, and the liability of preventing accidents to employees in having dangerous parts of machinery protected. Proprietors of factories and mills should give the matter of protecting machinery and guarding against accident or danger to life more thought.
