JONATHAN BOURNE, JR.



Republican Candidate for United States Senator. CHAMPION OF STATEMENT ONE.

JONATHAN BOURNE, Jr., candidate before the Republican primaries for the nomination of United States Senator in Congress for the long term commencing March 4, 1907, was born in New Bedford, Mass., February, 23, 1855; was a member of the class of 1877 at Harvard University; came to Portland May 16, 1878; was a Republican member of the Oregon Legislature in the session of 1885 and the extra session of 1886; was one of Oregon's delegates to the Republican National Convention of 1888 and Oregon's member of the Republican National Committee from 1888 to 1892, and a delegate to the Republican Convention of 1892; and was elected as a Mitchell Republican to the Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more prominently identified with the development of the mineral resources of Oregon than any other man in the State, having expended in the last 20 years over \$1,000,000 of his own money in the acquisition and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his residence and main office at Portland since 1878, he has had another office at New Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the business of his father's estate since 1889, which makes him familiar with many of the large interests and leading men in the East. These qualifications, in conjunction with his tremendous energy, originality, executive ability and experience in business and political affairs pre-eminently qualify him for making an able and influential Senator for the State of Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored extending the direct power of the people over their government as far as possible. He was one of the leading spirits in the Initiative and Referendum movement from 1896 until it was approved by the voters at the June election in 1902. In 1904 was a member of the executive committee of the

the Direct Primary Nominations League, and holds the same position with the People's Power League at this time. In all these movements he has been one of the few to guarantee the necessary expenses of preparing and proposing their measures to the people.

Parcels post including rural delivery.

Pure food laws.
Liberal appropriations for Panama canal, Coast defenses, river and harbor improvements, including Columbia, Willamette rivers, Coos, Yaquina and other Oregon harbors, Celilo canal, Government canal at Oregon City.

Fair share of irrigation fund for Oregon.

Loyal support of successful candidates.

Rigid enforcement of statement one.

Roosevelt for second elective term. I desire that the following statement be printed after my name on the nominating ballot.

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F. A. CRAWFORD.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR THE NOMINATION OF REPRESENTATIVE.

F. A. Crawford is a resident of West Dayton Precinct, his Post-office address being Crawford. He is not only a native son, but also a native of Yamhill County; his father Medore Crawford, being one of the signers of the articles of the Provisional Government in 1843. Mr. Crawford is a staunch Republican and a man of strong convictions. At the earnest request of friends he has become a candidate for the Republican nomination for Representative, this being the first public honor he has ever sought. He is in favor of the election of United States Senators by the people, will abide by their choice in the June election; and is in favor of a constitutional amendment making the election of Senators direct. He is in favor of but one State Normal School for Oregon, and will vote and work accordingly if elected. Mr. Crawford stands for convict labor for the betterment of our public roads. He pledges his best efforts in behalf of the general welfare of Yamhill County and the State at large.

JESSE EDWARDS.

Republican candidate for the nomination of State Senator for Yamhill county.

For twenty-five years Jesse Edwards of Newberg, has been recognized as one of the representative citizens of the county. He has always been progressive; has stood for the best interests of Yamhill county, and had no little part in the development of its resources. He is the organizer and president of the Newberg Pressed Brick Company; operating the pioneer plant in this branch of industry, in the Pacific Northwest. In his work along educational and moral lines he has always stood for the highest type of citizenship. A life-long Republican, he has never held office, this being the first political honor to which he has aspired. Residing in a part of the county which has not been honored with the Senatorship for nearly a quarter of a century, his friends believe his candidacy should receive general favor. It now appears that there is a good prospect of Dayton getting a cannery. A \$1000 bonus has been raised to be given parties who will build and operate a cannery here. This will probably induce some one who has a practical knowledge of the canning business, to start a cannery here, after an investigation of existing conditions, and finding this a very favorable location in all respects, for a cannery; it having excellent transportation facilities, and the adjacent country being well adapted to the raising of fruit and vegetables of all kind, and all products used for canning purposes.

Miss Gail Laughlin made a good talk on Woman Suffrage, to a large audience in Nichols hall Monday evening. She presented the subject in a somewhat new and different manner from that in which it is usually presented. Miss Laughlin is a fluent speaker, and being conversant with her subject, presented it in a pleasing manner to her audience, making a favorable impression for the cause she advocates.

The State Printing Office is a very expensive office to the people of Oregon. Only one candidate for State Printer, Willis S. Dunaway, pledges himself to reduce the cost of the office. He is a man of good personal character, with a reputation for business integrity, and his friends have no doubt that he will make good his pledges of retrenchment in the most expensive office in the State.
