Proclamation of the Mayor of Dayton

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

Whereas there was duly submitted to the legal voters of the City of Dayton Yamhill County, State of Oregon, on the 17th day of May, 1912, at an election then duly held, to be adopted and approved or rejected by them, a bill for an Act, "To enact a municipal charter for the City of Dayton, in Yamhill County, Oregon, and to repeal an act entitled 'An Act to incorporate the City of Dayton, Oregon, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 11th, 1912, and amendments adopted by the legal voters of said City, November 15th, 1909, and November 25th, 1910," which said bill was entitled substantially as aforesaid, and where as due notice of said election was given, and said election was in all respects duly held and conducted in and by said City on said 17th day of May, 1912; and whereas at said election the question whether or not said proposed Charter for said City should be adopted and approved by the legal voters of said City was duly submitted to a vote of the legal voters, and by them legally voted on; and whereas there were, at said election, duly cast for the adoption, approval and enactment of said proposed Charter of

said City of Dayton, in Yamhill County, Oregon, (being the said bill above referred to) forty-three (43) legal votes and whereas at said election only thirty-one (31) votes were cast against the adoption, approval and enactment of said proposed Charter for said City of Dayton, in Yamhill County, Oregon, and whereas the vote cast at said election was duly canvassed by W. T. H. Tucker, Recorder of said City of Dayton on the 20th day of May, 1912, and it was ascertained by him that at said election forty-three votes were cast for the adoption, approval and enactment of said proposed Charter for said City of Dayton and only thirty-one votes were cast against the adoption and enactment of said proposed Charter for said City has been adopted, approved and enacted by a majority of twelve of the voters of said City; and whereas all of the said facts are legally known by the undersigned as mayor of said City of Dayton and it is my duty to make proclamation of said facts.

Now, therefore, I, Ed Hadaway Mayor of said City of Dayton, in Yamhill County, State of Oregon, in consideration of the premises, and by virtue of the power vested me as such mayor, do hereby proclaim and declare to all whom it may concern, that at the said election duly held and conducted as above stated, on the 17th day of May, 1912, in said City of Dayton, there were cast in favor of the adoption, approval and enactment of said proposed Charter for said City of Dayton (being said bill above referred to) forty-three legal votes and there were cast against the adoption, approval and enactment of said proposed Charter for the City of Dayton in said County and State only thirty-one votes, leaving a majority of twelve votes in favor of the adoption approval and enactment of said proposed Charter for said city of Dayton, in said County and State, and I do also hereby proclaim that said proposed Charter for the City of Dayton was duly adopted, approved and enacted by the legal voters of said City at said election by said majority of twelve legal votes cast as afore said, and I hereby proclaim to all whom it may concern, that said proposed Charter for said City of Dayton, in Yamhill County, Oregon, (being the bill above referred to) approved and adopted as aforesaid by a majority of all the votes cast at said election and that it is and will be in full force and effect as the Charter of said City of Dayton, in Yamhill County, Oregon, and as the law of said city from the date of this my proclamation.

and caused this proclamation to be attested by the City Recorder this 17th day of June, A. D. 1912 at the said City of Dayton, at my office in said city.

CAKE IS

GOOD FOOD

Article on Subject in Journal of Home Economies by O. A. C. Professor

That cake is a concentrated food, the average slice containing practically as much food value as one and one-half glasses of milk, is the opinion of Prof. Ava B. Milan of the domestic science department of the Oregon Agricultural College in, the first of the series of scientific articles on "Factors Affecting the Economic and the Dietetic Value of Foods", in the current number of the Journal of Home Economies.

When an article of diet comes into as general use as has cake, the factors effecting its economic and dietetic value as well as its quality justify study. There is a lack of definite knowledge of these factors and inadequate means of controlling the conditions. The purpose of the study was to show the effect of varying the kind and form of ingredients on the quality, the cost, and the economic and dietetic value of cakes.

The work was carried out on a typical whole egg and butter cake, one of a close grain and fine texture.

Among the interesting points in the paper are the following:— The cost of cakes may be reduced from the standpoint of time consumed in the mixing by melting as well as creaming the fat used, a saving of half the time of mixing. The best cakes are made by the use of fine pastry flours, although good cakes may be made with bread flour. The high gluten content in bread flour is undesirable in cakes. The form of sugar greatly affects the quality of the cake with little effect on the cost. Powdered sugar is most easily and thoroughly mixed in the solid state. Cakes of as good quality are obtained by using water as well as by using milk, either whole or condensed. When water is used the cake costs one and one-half cents less than when milk is used, but the food value is also decreased. Eggs are essential, serving as leavening agents and influencing the flavor, texture, grain, and food value. If fresh powders are used a fairly good cake may be made with desiccated eggs if fresh ones are not available. Reducing the amount of butter in the standard 3 cup flour recipe, from three-fourths to half a cup of butter, the food value is lowered but the quality seems improved. If the cakes are not eaten warm lard substitutes that are fresh may be used instead of butter.
