Japanese Fritters.

A delicious dessert, commonly known as Japanese fritters, is made of stale bread cut into two inch cubes, soaked in a custard until they have absorbed all the liquid possible, then drained until they stop dripping, rolled in fine breadcrumbs and fried in deep fat. The crusts should be removed from the bread. For the custard mix a cupful of milk with two eggs and a tea spoonful of vanilla. Serve the fritters with lemon sauce.

English Suet Pudding.

One pound flour, a half pound suet chopped fine, a half pound sugar, a half teaspoon salt, one pound raisins, a half teaspoon baking powder. Mix together with sufficient water to make a dough about the same consistency as for bread. Have a cloth wrung in hot water, in which place your mixture. Boil two hours or longer. Be sure to tie your pudding bag carefully and give pudding a chance to swell.
