FOREST FIRE LAW MISREPRESENTED

the business and incidentally the commissions of timber brokers.

The law provides that every timber land owner in the state, not residing within one and one-half miles of his property, shall furnish a sufficient patrol therefore during the dry season, and that in case he fails to do so the State Forester shall provide the same at a cost not to exceed 5 cents per acre per annum. Any amount so paid by the state shall be a lien upon the land and shall be collected with the next taxes.

It is obvious that the maximum expense to the owner of a quarter-section of timberland can not exceed \$8.00 per year, an amount that should scare no owner into disposing of his timber claim at a sacrifice.

One of the best ways for timberland owners to comply with the law is to join County Fire Patrol Associations that have been organized in most of the timbered counties of the state. It is expected that every timber county will have such an organization before the fire season arrives. The experience of these Associations, some of which have been in existence for four years, proves that adequate patrol can be secured at a cost of from 1-2 to 3-4 cents per acre, and if all of the timber owners join, the acreage cost will be materially decreased. Protection from fire at a cost of \$3.00 or \$4.00 per quarter-section should be welcomed by all timber owners, and it is hoped that no one will be induced to sell their holdings through misrepresentations made by unreliable timber brokers for the selfish purpose of increasing commissions.

A BOY BURGLAR

A boy of twelve, armed with a loaded revolver and a policeman's billy, caught in the act of robbing a grocery till that he had opened, is a startling item in the day's news.

Graduated also in the school of crime to the extent of an alias to conceal his identity this boy burg-

lar shows all the marks of a hardened criminal.

Each item in his equipment was the product of a distinct crime. It took an hour's questioning by the police to bring out the confession that he had stolen the revolver previously found on him and which he had alleged in the juvenile court that he had found.

The boy lived, breathed and had his being in an atmosphere of crime, for which his history, so far as known, offers no cause or excuse.

Has he gone so far on the road to destruction that his conversion to the comparatively calm and orderly progress of a respectable life is not to be hoped for, much less expected? Probably the excitement of a criminal life was his inspiration—the matching of his boyish wits and unreasoning daring against the laws that govern us all, and their guardians.

Such a case is far removed from that of the ordinary wayward boy brought before the juvenile judge. It is complicated by the knowledge that such an one would be a perfect poison if introduced into a society of ordinary boys who are submitted to the discipline of a training school in the reasonable expectation of their salvation to respectable and law-abiding life.

Doubtless there is hidden in even such a lad a spring of good. But who shall reach it and release it to influence his life? It is a remarkable and a pitiful case.

County School Notes

Furnished by the Superintendent and Supervisor.

The pupils of Dundee have cleaned the grounds, planted flowers and otherwise beautified the premises. They have one of the most beautiful grounds in the county. They have also organized a basket-ball team.

Webfoot, No. 27, is now a Standardized school. They are planning to have an Easter program, and another entertainment later to aid in the purchase of athletic goods, pictures and other material for school work. They have already purchased 53 books for the library, outside the state list, and have also secured some new blackboards. They are very much interested in athletics, and have rented 2 acres of ground for practice. They plan to win the hammer-throw at the State meet. A "Rural School Improvement Club" has been organized in this district, and two enthusiastic meetings have been held. At these meetings they appointed the following committees to have charge of the work of the Fair; Livestock, sewing, flowers, and gardening. Besides these committees, a man was appointed to look after the wood-work exhibit, and a lady to superintend the cooking. This school impressed the existence of the 62nd congress on the

minds of the pupils in a very unique manner, by holding appropriate funeral ceremonies over an image used to represent the congress. Prof. Gubser made a few fitting remarks, and flowers were strewn over the resting place of the image, while the bell was tolled in an impressive manner. It was all done in the most respectful and dignified manner possible, and was intended merely to impress on the minds of the pupils an historical incident.

Pleasantdale, No. 64, gave an interesting program recently, which pleased every one who attended. The net proceeds, from a financial point of view, amounted to \$25.25. The money will be used to purchase pictures and playground supplies. A heating and ventilating plant, a new floor and many new desks have been placed in this building this year.

W. A. Scott will close a very successful term of school at Peavine, No. 41, March 21. Appropriate exercises will be held in the evening.

Pike Valley, No. 52 will have a basket social on the evening of March 22nd. This is a very wide-awake, up-to-date district, and the people believe in making the school-house the social center of the community. The effect of their getting together, and studying the interests of the school is easily apparent to any one who visits the school, or who talks to the patrons on the matters.

The Rally held in Happy Valley by the people of that district, and districts 43, 63, and 41 on Saturday, March 15 was a decided success. F. H. Buchanan, of McMinnville, gave a splendid ad-

dress in the morning on one of the usual subjects, and W. A. Scott entertained them in the same manner in the afternoon. Miss Williamson, also of McMinnville, gave several readings that were well received, and which brought repeated encores. The pupils of the Rally districts gave a very entertaining program, and the teachers did their part toward making the meeting a success. The dinner served at the noon hour left a grave doubt in the minds of the visitors as to whether there is any necessity for teaching domestic science in that locality. The mothers understand the art so well, that there is nothing left to be desired. The next Rally will be held in Gopher Valley, No. 36, Saturday, March 29. Districts 36, 80, 57, 42, and 86 will take part.
