Silence—A Game.

This is really another way of playing "blind man's buff." After the player chosen for blind man has been blindfolded the other players all take up positions in different parts of the room and remain perfectly still and silent. The blind man then gropes his way around the room, feeling on chairs and under tables until he succeeds in touching some one. As there is or ought to be perfect silence in the room, the person caught is almost afraid to breathe, lest he reveal his identity. If the blind man guesses correctly his captive takes his place. After each fresh player is blindfolded one minute is allowed, in which all the players seek new hiding places in different parts of the room.

Age of the Typewriter.

The typewriter, like its ally, stenography, is much older than most people think. The first machine constructed was the work of an Englishman, Henry Mill, who patented it in 1714. The next recorded patent for a typewriter was granted in France in 1841 to a blind man, Pierre Foucault, whose machine was used in many public institutions throughout Europe. The first patent for a machine on the type bar principle dates from 1856, but to C. Z. Sholes, an American, belongs the credit of the machine which in 1873 was put on the market by a firm of gun-makers of New York and quickly revolutionized the correspondence of the world.
