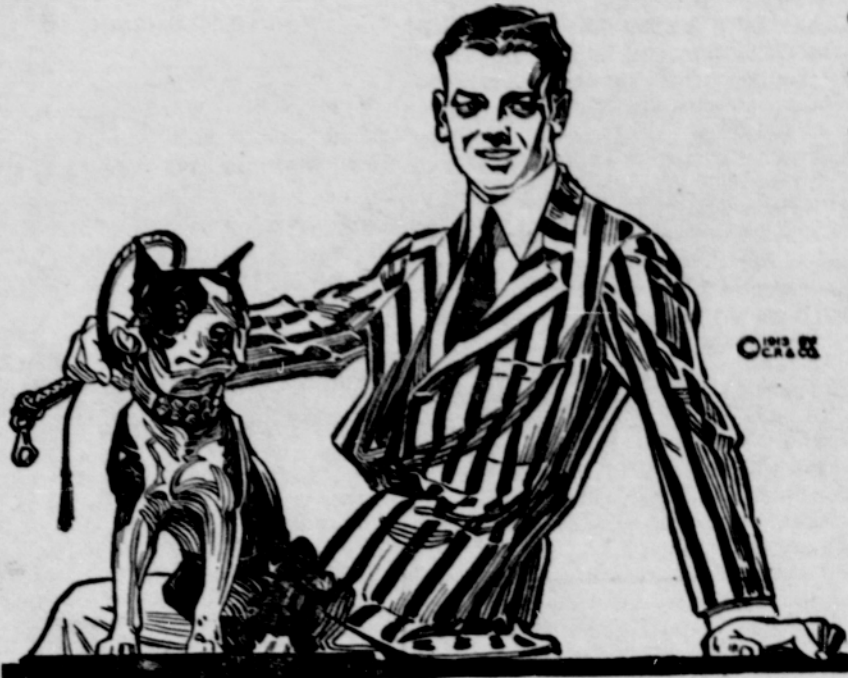

Mrs. J. A. McFarlane and Miss Mae Sheldon were Portland visitors Saturday.

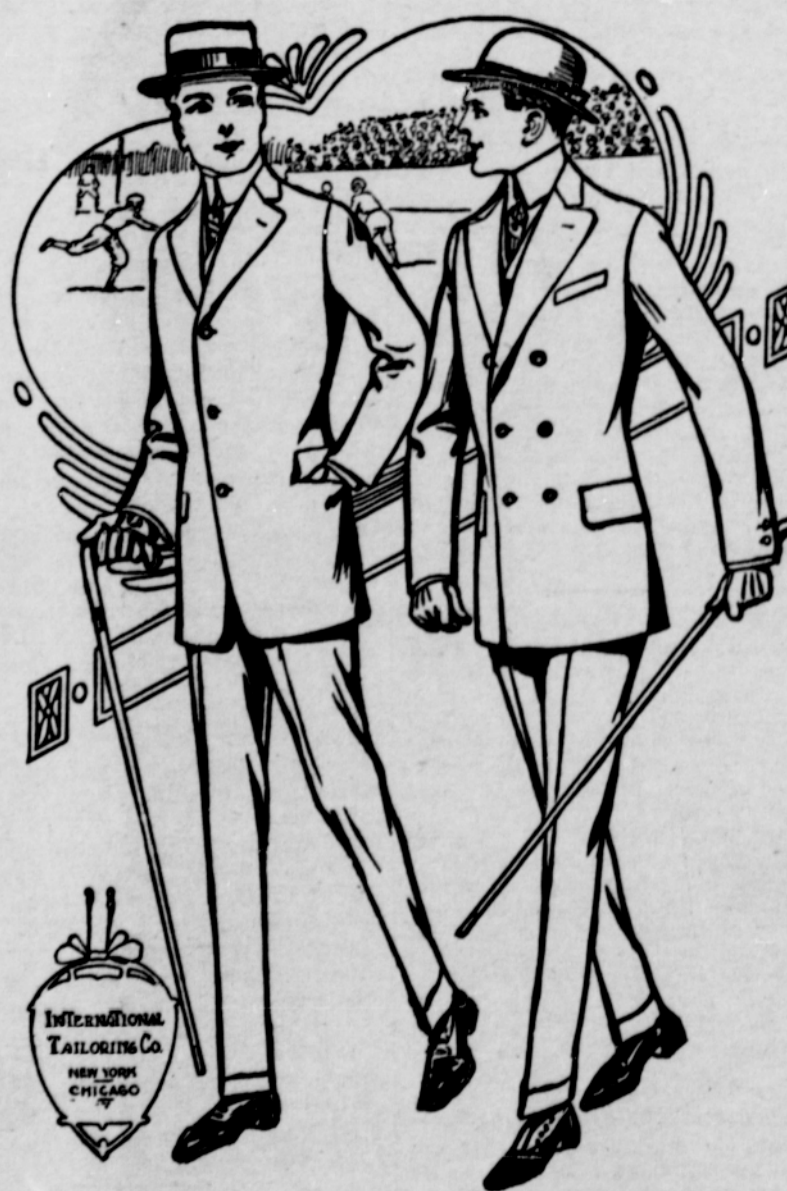
