The Department of Commerce has published statistics showing that the price paid by the consumer has advanced, while the Department of Agriculture shows that on July 1st the price received by the producer was 1 tenth of 1 per cent less than the average for seven years on that date, in spite of the boosting effect of the demand from Europe for foodstuffs. This seems to afford a most excellent opportunity for the Federal Trade Commission to investigate something.

John Skelton Williams threw out a dragnet the other day and brought a dozen bank examiners in to Washington, where he made a speech to them. He told them that, under the Federal reserve system it is practically impossible for a member bank to fail if operated within the law and with ordinary prudence and com-

monsense. But why "under the Federal Reserve System," especially? A bank which is honestly and prudently conducted can not fail under any system.

A report of the Department of Commerce approximates our exports of agricultural implements during the fiscal year 1915 at \$10,000,000, compared with \$40,600,000 in the high record year 1913. The report says that this loss of trade fell most heavily upon sales to Europe, and that "the European war was doubtless the dominant factor in the great falling off in our exports of agricultural implements in the fiscal year just ended, since the decrease in sales to Europe was disproportionate to that in sales to other sections."
