### ROAD DISTRICT VALUATIONS

Assessor Gives Road District Valuation, Tax Valuation and Levys Registration Meeting With Hearty Response—Other Items of Importance.

.005, tax \$788.47; No. 38, valuation 61,550, special levy .010, tax \$615.50; No. 39, valuation \$234,499.44, levy .005, tax \$1172.50; No. 40, valuation \$192,455, levy .005, tax \$962.27; No. 41, valuation \$213,815, levy .005, tax \$1069.08.

County Assessor Miller's office is busy with the 1915 tax roll. The rolls will be ready to turn over to the sheriff about Feb. 10. At the last session of the state legislature the law was changed, taking collection of taxes from the county treasurer's office back to the sheriff's office.

Several new precincts have been created by the county court, those affecting McMinnville and vicinity are particularly described as follows:

#### Precinct No. 28, McMinnville

Beginning at center of B and third streets and running south along center of B to the center of Handley street; thence west along center of Handley street; and a continuation thereof along footbridge over Cozine creek to east end of street or road running east and west through Cozine's second addition to McMinnville thence west along center of said street or road and a continuation or projection thereof to the center of Cozine creek; thence up Cozine creek in southerly direction to center of county road leading from McMinnville to Sheridan thence east along center of said road to intersection of said road leading from McMinnville to Whiteson at the Gus Paulus corner; thence south along said Whiteson road to center of South Yamhill river; thence up center of river in a southerly direction to the west boundary of Sec. 12, T. 5, S. R. 5 W. thence north along said boundary line to N. W. corner of Sec. 12; thence west to S. W. corner of Sec. 3 in said township and range; north to N. W. corner Sec. 3 thence west to the S. W. corner Sec. 31 in T. 4, S. R. 5 W., thence N to the N. W. corner of section 19 in said township and range; thence east to the point of where the north boundary line of Sec. 19 in T. 4, S. R. 4 W. intersects with the county road near the half section corner; thence south along the center of said county road to angle in road, thence in an easterly direction along the center of county road leading from McMinnville to the Masonic cemetery and along the center of Baker street in McMinnville to the center of A street; thence north along center of A street to center of Third street and thence east along said third street to place beginning.

#### Precinct No. 16, McMinnville

Beginning at crossing of D and Third streets thence south in center of D and Grant streets to the center of Cozine creek, thence up center of Cozine creek west to center of main county road leading from McMinnville to Whiteson; thence south along center of said road to center of South Yamhill river; thence down center of said river to point in line with center of Story street, thence west along center of Story to center of S. P. railroad track thence along said track north to center of Cozine creek thence west up said creek to point directly in line with center of F street to center of Third street; thence west along center of Third street to the place of beginning.

#### Precinct No. 38, McMinnville

Beginning at center of intersection of B and Third streets, and running south along center of B street to a point directly in the line with center of Handley street; thence west along cen-

ter of Handley street and a continuation or projection thereof along footbridge to east end of street or road running east and west through Cozine's 2nd addition to McMinnville; thence west along center of said street or road and a continuation or projection thereof to center of Cozine creek thence following up center of county road leading from McMinnville to Sheridan; thence east along center of said road to Gus Paulus corner, thence northwest along center of said road to center of Cozine creek, where said creek is crossed to wagon bridge near city hospital; thence east down center of Cozine creek to where said creek is crossed by Hoberg bridge; thence in a northerly direction along center of Third street to place of beginning.

#### Precinct No. 27

Beginning at the Southeast corner Sec. 14, T. 4 S. R. 5 W. thence north 4 miles; thence west 10 miles to the west boundary line of Yamhill county thence south 4 miles to the S. W. corner of Sec. 17 in T. 4 S. R. 6 W. thence east 10 miles to the place of beginning.

#### Precinct No. 17, McMinnville

Beginning center of Third and F streets; thence south along center of F street to center of Cozine creek; thence east down center of Cozine creek to the center of S. P. railroad track; thence south along said track to center of Storey street and a continuation or projection thereof to center of Yamhill river; thence up said river to the west line of Hawley's D. L. C.; thence south easterly along said line to angle corner of said Hawley D. L. C. thence northeasterly along east side of county road near there to north line of W. C. Goodrich D. L. C.; thence east to northeast corner thereof; thence due north to center of Yamhill river; thence up said river to a point due east of center of east end of Third street, thence west along center of Third street to the place of beginning.

Dayton, Oregon, Jan. 20, 1916  
To the Editor:—

## GYPSY BAND MADE GIRL, 16, A SLAVE

Was Sold to Rovers When Her Mother Died Nine Years Ago.

### RETURNS TO HER FATHER

Escaped After Extensive Traveling and Was Caught by Oakland Authorities, Who Acted on Her Story. Taken From Orphan's Home by Gypsies, Who Gave Fictitious Names.

Helena, Mont.—When Evelyn Mitchell, a sixteen year old girl, who for nine years has been the slave of gypsy bands in this country and the old world, threw herself into the arms of her father, a ranchman residing near a Montana town, it was the first time either had set eyes upon the other since the day of the mother's funeral in Helena nearly ten years ago. M. L. Riekman, secretary of the state bureau of child and animal protection, escorted the girl to the ranch from Glacier park, where he met her in charge of Miss Georgiana Allen, a Havre school-teacher, who agreed to chaperon the girl to Montana from a house of detention in Oakland, Cal.

H. A. Davee, state superintendent of public instruction, who was attending the National Teachers' association, was besought by the Oakland authorities to provide escort for the girl back to Montana. The city paid her expenses.

Superintendent Davee learned that Miss Allen, a teacher, was shortly to come home, and the latter went to the house of detention, where the girl has been kept two months to guard her against kidnaping by the gypsy band from which she was taken.

These arrangements were made for bringing her home, and the teacher and the girl departed secretly from San Francisco, embarking on a steamer for Astoria, from which point they went by train to Glacier park.

The necessity for keeping their whereabouts secret was urged by the girl, who was in terror of being seized by the band.

The history of the young woman reads like a romance. For several years she has been trying to escape from the gypsies; but, alone and friendless, she was given no opportunity until about three months ago, when the Oakland officials secured possession of her after a desperate fight in the courts. The Marino band, to which she was sold for \$2,000 in 1912, is rich, and money was spent lavishly to defeat justice.

About ten years ago, following the funeral of the mother, the girl and a

sister were placed in an orphan's home. There they remained for perhaps six months, when Evelyn was taken to Butte and in Judge Donlan's court upon the representations of an attorney adoption papers were made out for "Mary" Mitchell, placing her in charge of a couple named Giehl. It developed later that the Giehls were members of a gypsy band.

Evelyn was an attractive little girl, and she was soon dressed in rags and started out as a beggar. Her pretty face and sad eyes affected the charitable disposed, and her collections were not the least of the loot of the band.

As the girl grew older she longed for a return to "American life," as she called it. Living in wagons or tents along the highways, half starved and beaten by the Giehl couple whenever she did not bring home as much money as they considered adequate, her existence was unhappy.
