WHY DON'T DAYTON GROW

This question has been one of the foremost questions in the social and commercial circles of this city for a number of years. It has been asked by the people from the street corners, in the public meetings and has virtually been herald from the house tops. The answers given to this question have been various, but none have seemed to be satisfactory, for the question is still in existence.

Ask this question of the business men of the city and they will tell you that one very good reason is that the people of this city and surrounding country do not place enough confidence in this city. That they spend to much of their money with the mail order house and in the towns of large size which lie adjacent to this. In one sense of the word this is true. The people depend only on their home town for the things they cannot get elsewhere any cheaper.

Now we have been dealing with the people outside of the business men. Let's take a look at what the business men are doing for the city. We use a few illustrations how the business men are aiding the newspaper office in this city to make a livelihood. A few days ago the publishers of the Tribune were asked to figure on a receipt job for the city. These receipt were to be printed on good bond paper in duplicate. They gave us the privilege of figuring on 1500 of these receipts. We gave them a price and they seemed to be very well satisfied with the price. When the recorder went to confer with another of the city officials a traveling man of some Portland stationery firm was present. He told the gentlemen that our price was lower than his firm could put them out for and the recorder was instructed to purchase the receipts from the Tribune. A little later the traveling man found that he had a sample of a duplicate receipt put up on much cheaper paper, and was of an ordinary blank receipt, which is put out in stock form by his company that the city could purchase at a much lower figure by taking a smaller quantity. Instead of allowing the Tribune office the privilege

of re-bidding on this job on the same priced material, the city ordered from the Portland firm. This is only one of the many items that we might mention.

While we are in the business of answering "Why don't Dayton Grow," we might refer to another little incident that has occurred in our city during the past two or three months. The Bank in this city has been in the habit of furnishing checks to all the customers, and to the merchants of the city they have been issuing a special check with the firms name printed at the top. These checks did not cost the merchant one single penny. The bankers, who are believers of patronizing home enterprises gave the printing of these checks to the local printers. Now it seems that the checks put out by the local printers were not good enough for the business men, also some of them ordered three thousand checks from a Portland firm, and paid said Portland firm several dollars more for their three thousand checks than they could have purchased them for at the local printers.

By making their purchase from the Portland firm they have cut the local printers out of a number of dollars that they might have otherwise had.

On top of these above remarks, we might ask the question, "Why don't Dayton Grow," and we might also answer the same question. Because the people of Dayton and surrounding country haven't enough faith in the city itself, and are too willing to spend their money outside towns where it will not benefit the other fellow or themselves. Every dollar that is spent in this city helps to build up the town and make conditions better.

At the close of the chorus Mr. Kidder, a member of the school board, gladdened the hearts of the girls, and others as well, by announcing that the new high school piano was in the depot. When the high school lighting system is installed little will be left to do to make this one of the best equipped schools in the state.

On Friday almost no effects of the recent storm were evident in the Willamina school, and Prin. Miss Bethel Ballard, Mrs. Mona Miller, Miss Ada Partington, Miss Leolin Billings, Miss Gertrude Imus, Mrs. Edith Coleman, and J. Marvin Howes were conducting their various departments as usual. Miss Ballard, Miss Partington and Mr. Howes are doing the high school work and Miss Ballard has personal charge of the Teachers' Training class, who will all be entitled to teachers' certificate on graduation. Several of the class were doing observation and practice work during our visit and their efforts were being carefully supervised by the teachers in charge as well as by Miss Ballard. Instead of the usual recess period, a system of marching through the various rooms has been in use during the inclement weather and the discipline during this march was especially commendable. This is a standard four year high school, as are also Sheridan and Newberg mentioned above. The people are talking of erecting a play shed in the near future but as the expense of bringing the school up to standard has been heavy the other improvements will have to wait for a time. The pupils were anticipating a lively basket ball game in the evening and we regret that we could not accept the invitation to remain to attend.

Yamhill county now has nine standard high schools and offers to her young people as good educational advantages as any county in the state. The same can be said of her colleges as well, and Yamhill pupils have little need of going elsewhere to equip themselves for their work in life. The Junior High school of McMinnville won out in the basket ball game with the Dayton High school last Saturday evening, and the Senior High school was also successful in a similar contest with the Jefferson High school of Portland on the same evening.
