OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

Having disposed of his entire stock of liquor, Daniel Hannuk, owner and master of the gasoline launch Union, which had been dispensing wet goods outside the mouth of the Columbia river for several days, brought the craft into Astoria.

Forty timber cruisers and land examiners, assisted by as many compass men, are now actively engaged in classifying the O. & C. grant lands, according to Louis L. Sharp, chief of the field division of the United States general land office.

Heads of ten state institutions under the supervision of the state board of control submitted estimates of their financial needs for the next two years, totaling \$2,047,515.54. This is \$430,991.93 more than the appropriations made for the 1915-1916 biennium.

The Josephine county court has offered a reward of \$100 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the party or parties guilty of maliciously killing cattle in the Provolt and Murphy districts on the Applegate river, about 10 miles from Grants Pass.

In constructing the Natron-Oakridge branch of the Southern Pacific in Lane county, 11 miles of wagon road were destroyed when the county's right of way was taken over. A new road has been made by the railroad company and formally accepted by the county.

Increases in the demurrage rate charged Oregon shippers for holding freight cars beyond the free time limit is urged upon the Oregon public service commission by the Southern Pacific company, in recommendations submitted by the railroad for relief of the present car shortage.

The Oregon public service commission has abandoned its proposed investigation to determine the value of the properties of the Oregon Trunk railway, because of action by the interstate commerce commission which has undertaken the valuation of all railroads in the United States.

For the purpose of ascertaining public sentiment it is proposed in Linn county to request the county court to submit to the people a proposition to increase the tax levy for road purposes. It is planned to make a greater increase than permitted under the Bingham law regulating taxation.

A timber sale approximating \$340,000 was made by the government, the timber being on the middle fork of the John Day river, Whitman national forest, and amounting to 124,000,000. The buyer was the Pacific States Timber Investment company, of which Frank B. Mitchell, of Baker, is president.

O. H. Todd of Eugene, representing his brother, A. N. Todd & Co., of Kalamazoo, Mich., the largest peppermint buyers in the country, has been in Linn county buying up the oil of peppermint which has been distilled this year. The Linn county crop this year is estimated from \$7000 to \$8000 worth.

The Oregon City locks around the falls of the Willamette, bought by the federal and state governments at a cost of \$300,000 from the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, are practically useless at the present time, because of the shallowness of the lower lock chamber at the present stage of the river.

Engineers' maps of the channel of the Columbia river and the Willamette, and also of the mouth of the Columbia, showing the new 40-foot depth that has been obtained, will be published by the Portland chamber of commerce and circulated widely in shipping circles to advertise the merits of the port.

At the end of the first year of co-operative shipments of livestock by the farmers of Lane county under the direction of C. J. Hurd, marketmaster of the Lane county Pomona grange, 50 carloads of livestock and 40,000 pounds of wool, valued at \$100,000 have been sold in the Portland market,

At a meeting of farmers held at Corvallis at the call of State Grange Master C. E. Spence, resolutions were adopted urging that the state of Oregon acquire lime deposits in the state and operate same by convict labor and furnish the product at cost with reasonable percentage added, to provide for a sinking fund to the farmers of the state to use in reclaiming their lands.

State Engineer John H. Lewis has just completed a trip of inspection over a large part of the proposed highway from Florence on the coast of Lane county to Klamath Falls. The Florence to Klamath Falls highway is being urged as one of the roads to be constructed partially from funds to be received from the federal government under the terms of the Shackleford bill.

Tangible evidence of the prosperity which is growing in Oregon at an amazing rate is furnished in the combined statement of state and national banks and trust companies made public by State Bank Superintendent Sargent. All records for an increase in resources and deposits in a similar length of time were broken in the period beginning June 30 and ending September 12, when the statements were prepared.

The state board of control has appointed a commission of three to investigate and report to it upon the needs of the Oregon state training school for boys and the state industrial school for girls.

Captain George H. Dunbar, formerly master of the dredge Chinook, but during the past four years master of the government survey steamer Arago, committed suicide at Astoria by shooting himself in the head.

To keep pace with its new era of agricultural and industrial development, Josephine county within a year plans to have completed in Grants Pass, its county seat, a new courthouse to cost between \$70,000 and \$80,000.

Linlithgow was the birthplace of Mary, queen of Scots; in Linlithgow church James IV. of Scotland was forewarned by an apparition of the coming disaster at Flodden Field; in its streets the regent Murray was shot; close by the town Edward I. had two ribs broken by his horse the night before Falkirk, and on its loch a chancellor of the exchequer, bent on economy, issued instructions that the royal swans should be kept down to a dozen.—Argonaut.
