**"Pride of Chemawa"**  
 Mr. Gillette has a fine patch of sweet  
 corn, "Pride of Chemawa," on the  
 Bertram place that is about ready to  
 eat. It was planted last July and has  
 made a fine growth. It will be market-  
 ed in Dayton, so you will have an op-  
 portunity to test its quality.  
 Sweet corn is best when cooked as  
 soon as possible after being picked. It  
 loses its sweetness rapidly after it is  
 picked, so that within twenty-four  
 hours much of the fine flavor has gone  
 into the cob.  
 Take freshly picked corn, put it into  
 boiling water and boil for fifteen min-  
 utes, and serve while hot, and the corn  
 will be as good as the variety that you  
 cooked, can be.

Shortly you will have a chance at  
 this much talked about corn, "Pride of  
 Chemawa." Cook it as directed and  
 see if you have ever eaten any variety  
 quite as good. There are people in this  
 town who say that it is the best they  
 ever ate. Write Mr. A. H. Gillett what  
 you think of the quality of the corn.
