Minor Matter of More than Passing Interest

County Registration totals 8,118. County Clerk Wilson has prepared for the secretary of state interesting data on the registration for Yamhill county. It shows 4707 Republicans, 2914 men and 1793 women; Democrats 2294, men 1393, women 901; Prohibitionists 739, men 230, women 509; Socialists 125, men 99, women 26; Miscellaneous 253, men 161, women 92. Total 4797 men; 3321 women; total voters 8118 in county.

Jacobsen gets Damages

The damage suit of Hans H. Jacobsen against J. B. Vanderbeck and A. Vanderbeck to recover \$5,000 damages and \$75 medical expenses for alleged injuries sustained in an automobile accident on the Rex Hill on April 21, was stubbornly contested in the circuit court here last week. The jury found a verdict in favor of the father, J. B. Vanderbeck, which carries costs in favor of the father; but found \$150 against the son, A. B. Vanderbeck, who is about 18 years old, and may make its collection somewhat difficult. The case consumed two days Messrs Schmidt and Bradley A. Ewers, of Portland, and R. L. Conner of McMinnville appeared for plaintiff; and B. A. Elks for the Vanderbecks.

In the Jacobsen vs the Vanderbecks action for personal damages; the defendant A. Vanderbeck was granted six days to move for a new trial.

LIGHTING LAW DEFINED

Notice is hereby given that by virtue of authority of General Laws of Oregon for 1919, Chapter 181, effective May 29, 1919, entitled,

To require owners, lessees and operators of places of employment to provide emergency and general natural and artificial lighting; defining how the minimum of light shall be established; requiring the commissioner of labor and inspector of factories and workshops to enforce the same; and providing a penalty for failure to comply with the provisions of this act.

That to carry out the provisions of the act; to establish certain minimum values for lighting, and to arrive at what shall be used in the schedule of minimum lighting, and such other rules as shall determine definitely what shall constitute compliance with the provisions of this act, a commission of three persons has been appointed, namely, F. C. Knapp, president Peninsula Lumber Co. representing the manufacturing interests, Vern H. Haybarker, representing the operating electrical workers, and F. H. Murphy, an electrical engineer, who will on the 28th day of June 1919, at Room 501 Court House Portland, at 2 p. m. o'clock, hold a public meeting to give hearing to those interested and to be advised in order to establish, to rearrange or readjust the schedule of lighting values and rules. IN MEMORIAM

Emmett VanWyke Filer was born at Sag Harbor, New York, November 6, 1850 and died at his home in Dayton, Oregon, June 10, 1919 aged 68 years, 7 months and 4 days.

He is survived by two children, Mrs. Elmer E. Baxter and Emmet S. Filer, both of Dayton, and three sisters, Mrs. Nancy Phillips, of Sag Harbor, New York, Mrs. Ada Bolles, of Hartford, Connecticut, and Mrs. Hattie Stanley, of Dayton Oregon.

In his 19th year he went west and lived a few years in Texas, and Kansas, finally locating in Nebraska. He followed the cattle business several years and became an expert rider and rope thrower. He made seven trips over what was known as the cattle trail from Texas to Kansas and Nebraska and finally rode the range in that state a couple of more years. For a time he engaged in the livery business in Plum Creek, now Lexington, Nebraska, and eventually owned and run a drug store in Lexington.

In 1888 he returned to his old home in New York and was married there to Miss Lillie Wade returning to Lexington, Neb., where they made their home for 25 years. To this union three children were born, one dying in infancy.

He came with his family to Dayton, Oregon, about 14 years ago where he continuously resided to the time of his death. A little over two years ago his wife died and was laid to rest near this city.

He was a member of Jacob Mayer Lodge No. 108 A. F. & A. M. and was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America for the last 24 years. The subject of this sketch has always been an active and energetic man, giving liberally of his time, labor and money for the advancement and betterment of the locality where he resided. His convictions, whether right or wrong, were honest and sincere, resulting from careful study and analysis on his part, and with which he calmly met the fate of all flesh.

The funeral services were held in the Methodist church, Wednesday afternoon, June 11, Reverend Marcy officiating. A large concourse of sorrowing friends followed the remains to the Odd Fellows cemetery where he was laid to rest beside his departed wife, after the funeral ritualistic ceremony of the Masonic fraternity was rendered by the members of his lodge who were out in great numbers to pay their last respects to their departed brother. PAINT PROTECTION AND ITS ECONOMY.

The preservation of structural materials, which may be obtained through the application of paint, constitutes a most vital means of furthering the conservation of our natural resources. It is, moreover, the most economical method of sustaining the appearance and general upkeep of any community.

A structure coated with sheets of India rubber would not be as well protected from decay as a structure coated with a good oil paint. This is due to the fact that a sheet of rubber is not so durable or as waterproof as a thin dried film of paint. The latter material when applied dries to a continuous elastic film containing finely divided particles of metallic, wear resisting pigments. A square foot of such a film upon a wooden surface costs less than a penny, yet it will beautify and protect a dollar's worth of surface for many years. This is a low rate of insurance.

Dwellings, barns, outbuildings, sheds, posts, fences, stock enclosures, wagons, implements, windmills and other structures, whether of wood, iron or cement, should be preserved, through the use of paint, from rapid decay. High grade paint may be used successfully for all such purposes. Colored paints will be found the most serviceable, the coloring matter in the paint adding from two to three years to the life of the coating.

Rare Visitors Recorded.

The appearance of snowy owls, a rare occurrence, is reported. These remarkably beautiful birds come from the Arctic regions. Only four previous visitations have been recorded in the ornithological history of the country.
