RECKLESS DRIVING KILLS HUNDREDS

A passenger train approaching at full speed and still a quarter of a mile away will cover the remaining distance in 18 seconds; if half a mile away, it will flash past in 36 seconds.

These figures are offered by R. J. Clancy, safety specialist of the Southern Pacific, to impress upon motorists the significance of attempting to cross railroad tracks with a train in sight.

"Motorists should think in terms of time as well as distance. It requires a wait of only a fraction of a minute to permit a train to pass. On the other hand, 18 seconds allows too small a margin to escape an accident if in shifting gears the engine stops or anything goes wrong.

"Forty-six people were killed, 173 people were injured and 152 automobiles were damaged or destroyed at grade crossings during the calendar year just closed. Of these, 73 stalled on the crossing and were struck by trains; 263 attempted to cross almost immediately in front of an approaching train; 137 or more than 25 per cent of the total, ran into trains instead of trains into them, 9 skidded into cars or trains in attempting to avoid collision after realizing the danger; 31 ran into and broke down crossing gates lowered to protect them from passing trains; 5 ran down and injured flagmen in warning position; 4 were due to miscellaneous causes."

Inexperience of drivers rather than deliberate recklessness is the principal cause of such accidents in Clancy's estimation.

INCOME TAX REPORT NOW DUE

The time has again arrived for making out your Income Tax Returns. The law provides that all returns must be in the office of the Collector of Internal Revenue at Portland, on or before March 15th, 1920. Those failing to comply with the law are subject to heavy penalties.

All tax payers are urged to make out their returns at once, thereby avoiding the rush at the last hour.

LEGAL EXPERTS TO ANSWER DUTCH

French to Prepare an Extensive Survey of the Case.

Paris.—The reply to the refusal of the Dutch government to comply with the demand of the allies for the surrender of former Emperor William was the first subject discussed at the initial meeting of the council of the ambassadors, created to carry on the unfinished routine work of the supreme council of the peace conference which disbanded last week.

It was decided that the French legal experts available should go into all the aspects of the case and prepare the reply, which probably will be submitted for approval of the council early next week.

The council was presided over by Premier Millerand, Hugh C. Wallace, the American ambassador, was present with the other members of the body.

The council received a letter from Stanislaus Patek, Polish minister of foreign affairs, calling attention to the possibility of a strong aggressive movement by the Bolsheviks against Polish territory and recommending that a plan be adopted for defensive measures. The letter asked that the question be called to the attention of Marshall Foch.

COMMUNIST PARTY HELD REVOLUTIONARY

Washington.—The communist party of America was held by Secretary Wilson of the labor department to be "a revolutionary party" within the meaning of the statutes providing for deportation of aliens who affiliate with such organizations. In the specific case of Englebert Preis, an Austrian, arrested in recent raids, execution of a deportation warrant was ordered by Mr. Wilson, paving the way for deportation of a large number of aliens now in custody against whom similar charges have been brought.

The ruling was made in a formal opinion in which documents relating to the communist party are discussed, and in conclusion the secretary said:

"The only conclusion is that the communist party of America is an organization that believes in, teaches and advocates the overthrow by force or violence of the government of the United States."

RUSSIANS ATTACK YANKS

Two Americans Slain in Clash With Semenoff's Men.

Washington.—Two American soldiers were killed and one severely wounded in the clash with a Russian detachment of General Semenoff's forces on January 10, near Posolskaya, while five Russians were killed, one wounded and fifty-five captured, including one general and six other officers.

In reporting the clash to the war department, Major General Graves, commanding the American expedition in Siberia, said the Russians, in an armored car, made an unprovoked attack on the Americans, who were in a similar car. The Russian attack was repulsed and the Americans then captured the car and its occupants.

General Graves said he believed the incident could be peacefully adjusted with General Semenoff "who could not have been responsible."

No Change in Reservations.

Washington.—No change in the reservations affecting article 1 of the league of nations covenant or the Monroe doctrine provision of the peace treaty will be acceptable to the re-

publicans, Senator Lodge informed Senator Hitchcock and other members of the informal democratic committee which had been conferring with Senator Lodge's committee in an effort to reach a compromise on the treaty.

Senate Refuses to Censure Sims.

Washington.—The senate rejected, 33 to 20, an effort by Senator Walsh, Mont., to call up his resolution proposing to censure Rear Admiral William S. Sims for disclosure of information of a "confidential character" in connection with his appearance before the sub-committee investigating naval decoration awards. The vote was on strict party lines.

Anti-Bolshevik Forces Lose in Siberia

London.—Irkutsk has fallen to the Siberian social revolutionaries while revolts have spread throughout the entire country, virtually overwhelming the all-Russian anti-Bolshevik government, a Tien Tsin dispatch says.

Poles Prepare to Fight.

Copenhagen.—The Polish cabinet has signed a mobilization order, says a Warsaw report.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

More than \$250,000 of the \$550,000 road bond issue of Douglas county is unexpended.

The annual convention of the Christian and Missionary alliance will open at Hood River February 1.

There has been little improvement in the car shortage situation in Oregon during the past few weeks.

School teachers of Hood River have organized an association for the purpose of securing better salaries.

The validity of the state dog license law has been sustained by Circuit Judge McCourt of Multnomah county.

The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce is uncovering a lot of names that were not found by the census enumerators.

The state lime board has confirmed the order closing operations at the state lime quarry at Gold Hill until spring.

County officials estimate that there are 1600 dogs in Jackson county. So far only 800 owners have taken out a state license.

Trappers are doing unusually well in Klamath county this season. It is probable that the season's catch will run to 15,000.

The sixth annual Marion County Corn show was held at Salem, with exhibits on hand from many sections of the Willamette valley.

The Oregon State Association of National Farm Loan organizations held its second annual meeting at Salem, Tuesday and Wednesday.

The California-Oregon Power company is removing its poles and lines at Ashland. Its business has been absorbed by the municipal system.

The schools of Mapleton, Swisshome and Westlake, all in the extreme west end of Lane county, are closed on account of smallpox in the districts.

The constitutionality of the fish and game legislation, creating a fish and game commission of nine members will be tested by the Multnomah Anglers' club.

Mrs. B. A. Lemon, a pioneer of Benton county, is dead. She crossed the plains from Missouri in 1852, settling near Monroe, where she has since resided.

A hog show and sale will be held at Salem February 4, when 43 head of brood sows and gilts, from the champion producing breeders of the West, will be sold.

It is estimated that damage done to Umatilla county roads by recent floods and washouts will amount to \$25,000. Permanent repairs will not be made until spring.

Newton A. Blogett, resident of Oregon for the past 60 years, died at his home in Albany, aged 86 years. He had resided in the Willamette valley for the past 40 years.

Fred J. Holmes, aged 62 years, president of the La Grande National bank and one of Union county's foremost citizens, died at his home in La Grande from heart trouble.

Because of complaints that census enumerators had failed to list a good many individuals, the city council of

Roseburg is taking steps to have a more complete count.

Dr. Francis A. Bailey, pioneer physician of Washington county and widely known throughout the state, died at Hillsboro at the age of 81, following an attack of pneumonia.

As a result of numerous complaints of people missed in the census, the Eugene Chamber of Commerce has asked for blanks so that those who have been missed may be counted.

Reports from Drew in Douglas county, a few miles above Tillam, indicate that a rich gold strike has been made. The ledge uncovered is said to assay more than \$500 to the ton.

That the damage to Marion county fruit growers will be light is indicated in a report made by Professor Brown of the O. A. C., who has just completed an inspection of the orchards.

Admissions by a man charged with murder in the presence of a sheriff, if made voluntarily, are admissible at the trial of the defendant, according to an opinion of Attorney General Brown.

After several weeks of preparation the Willamette University Glee club will make its first long tour through Eastern Oregon and Washington during the two weeks beginning January 29.

J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, announced at the annual convention of the state dairymen at Eugene that he will retire from office at the expiration of his present term.

The work of the woman forest fire lookouts in the Cascade forest last summer was so successful that N. F. Macduff, supervisor of the forest, has declared that he wants a large number for next summer's work. He says they will be employed this year in greater numbers than ever.

Green Always Harmonious.

The professional mixer of paints knows that fierce color discord can easily be created by a misplacing of green. But nature never misplaces it. Even blue stands without tinging, cheek by cheek with nature's greens. Larkspurs and lobelias go quietly arm in arm with their respective foliage. Any rose of any tint or color is best set off by a green rose leaf. Every spring or fall color, pale or florid, will shade pleasantly into green on the very same leaf.

Roumanian Superstitions.

Ghosts are plentiful in Roumania. The Strigol are evil spirits which on St. Andrew's night make their way for mischief into every house whose doors and windows are not anointed with garlic, the scent of that plant being intolerable to the ghostly nostrils. The Moroi are the spirits of unbaptized babes, crying for their mothers' breasts and not to be appeased save by sprinkling their graves with holy water for seven years.
