Birth of Red Cross Idea.

The suffering of soldiers in the Crimean war first directed the world's attention to the merit of systematic care for the wounded. In 1859 M. Henri Dunant was visiting Italy and witnessed the carnage of the battle of Solferino. He organized volunteers to help take care of the wounded. Out of his work grew the conference at Geneva, in 1863, and another in 1864. These conferences were the formal beginning of the Red Cross. The name and insignia were adopted. The American Red Cross was organized by Clara Barton in 1881.

NAVY WILL HAVE 940 SHIPS

Peace Strength Will Include 16 Dreadnaughts, Says Admiral.

Washington. — Approximately 940 warships, including 16 dreadnaughts, 13 pre-dreadnaughts, eight armored cruisers and 17 light cruisers will be the peace-time strength of the American navy after July 1, the house naval committee was told by Rear-Admiral Taylor, chief of the bureau of construction and repair. This will be three times the number in commission when the United States declared war on Germany, but the comparative tonnage will only be about one and one-half times as great.

Japan Asks China to Negotiate.

Washington.—The Japanese embassy here was informed officially that the Japanese government had invited China to enter upon negotiations for the return of German rights in Shantung and that while some of the younger elements in China had opposed the acceptance of the invitation, on the ground that China was not yet a member of the League of Nations, it was believed the Chinese are inclined to accept the invitation.

Houston and Meredith Confirmed.

Washington.—The senate has confirmed David F. Houston as secretary of the treasury, and E. T. Meredith as secretary of agriculture.

Sergeant James Xavier McGillin, United States marine corps, told this to the wide world as he stepped ashore at Charleston, S. C., recently from the transport which had carried him back from two years in the West Indies. He had a tale to tell, and this is how he told it:

"On the way up," he continued (brogue deleted for the benefit of the linotypers), "we stopped off at Nassau, in the Bahamas. I was walking along the street when up to me steps one of them natives with a face as black as me old mother's stove.

"'Shure an' 'tis a foine day fer th' Oirish," says he to me. I makes to slough him, when another marine grabs me by the arm. He'd been there before, this other marine, and he explains it all.

"It seems that a hundred years ago—or maybe it was a thousand—the British sends one of their English regiments of Irishmen to the Bahamas, and the natives learned English from them. Ever since they've talked with a brogue."

Soldiers' Heads Growing.

Some cynical stay-at-homes have complained that the returned soldiers have "Got the big head," but the London hatters find it literally true. The sizes most in demand before the war were 6½ and 6¾, but now they sell more hats of 7 and 7½.—Vocational Summary.
