Presidential Inauguration.
March 4 was chosen by the constitutional convention as the time for organizing and convening congress, by resolution of Sept. 13, 1788. The delay between election and inauguration was intended evidently to give legislators and executives time to reach the capital in those days of slow traveling. Washington was not inaugurated until April 30, 1789, because of delays, but his term of office was considered to have begun on March 4. The act of March 1, 1792, fixed the date of inauguration as the 4th day of March.
