**Electric Ovens.**  
 Electric heat finds its widest use in  
 ovens, which have proved specially val-  
 uable in the automobile industry for  
 baking the Japan on car bodies. By  
 this means Japan is baked on 3,000  
 bodies every day. Other large users  
 of such ovens are telephone and  
 typewriter factories, foundries, mak-  
 ers of iron frames for beds and cots  
 and manufacturers of chemicals. Elec-  
 tric devices of the sort are employed  
 for baking effervescent salts, and for  
 drying a large variety of products re-  
 quiring well-regulated heat and clean  
 air in the oven itself.

**"Electoral College."**  
 Properly speaking, there is no such  
 institution as an electoral college. The  
 electors, who are voted for by the  
 people, meet in their respective states  
 and cast their votes for president and  
 vice president. These are sealed and  
 sent by special messenger to the vice  
 president of the United States, acting

 in the presence of both houses of con-  
 gress assembled, opens the vote and  
 declares the result.

 the Semana Medica (Buenos

 his foot, thus walking by the natural  
 bending of knee and ankle.
