GERMAN ECONOMIC SITUATION IS BAD

France Marks Time, While Austria Shows Signs of Improving.

Washington, D. C.—German economic conditions are bad, France is marking time and Austria shows some signs of improvement, according to reports to the commerce department from its representatives in those countries.

Failure of plans for foreign loans has brought about the new period of currency depression in Germany, it was reported, but German industry in general is profiting by the decline, as it gives a new opportunity for dumping abroad and for increased inland sales. Many industries, however, are hampered by lack of coal and rising labor costs. French exchange was said to be steadily declining, but employment increasing, and the general industrial situation has shown no important development during the past month.

Slight improvement in the Austrian economic situation was seen. The serious conditions arising in June on account of exhaustion of British credit and delays in other credits has not materially improved, but exchange is coming back slowly and the situation is clearing up slightly with the final granting of the French credit and the actual receipt of 20,000,000 francs.

Colfax-Walla Walla Permit Refused. Olympia, Wash.—Because the railroads afford ample service and opposition from the towns to be served was quite general, the department of public works denied a certificate for a passenger and express stage run between Colfax and Walla Walla.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

The walnut crop of the Willamette valley is said to be exceptionally good this year.

Mrs. Augusta N. Bradeen has been appointed postmistress at Blitzen, Harney county.

Oregon editors will meet in Corvallis Friday and Saturday for their annual potlatch.

An advance of 3 cents per quart in milk prices was announced by Klamath Falls dairies.

In the view of oldtime residents, Lincoln county is this year witnessing the driest year on record.

The Selo berry crop is being cut short because of the continued drought and the scarcity of pickers.

A can shortage is hindering operations at the big cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association.

A cut of 4.6 mills in the school budget of the Pendleton school district was effected during the school year just closed.

Construction of ten new dry kilns, making a total battery of 30 has been begun at the Shevlin-Hixon company's plant at Bend.

More than 100 students at the state normal at Monmouth passed Friday in Salem inspecting the state departments and institutions.

Five thousand dollars towards a \$15,000 fund for purchasing a permanent fairground at Klamath Falls was raised by a committee.

The plant of the Eugene Excelsior company resumed operations Monday, after an idleness of several weeks. Extensive repairs have been made.

A big picnic is planned by the Yachats farm bureau community for its big annual farm bureau picnic to be held at Yachats July 21 and 22.

Mrs. Robert Howard, aged 64 years, wife of the manager of the June Drake farm near Silverton, committed suicide by hanging herself from a rafter in a barn.

Rapid progress is being made in paving the Pacific highway between Albany and Harrisburg. Big crews are working out of Tangent, Sheed, Halsey and Harrisburg.

Motor vehicle licenses for the year 1922 have passed the 118,000 mark, according to a report prepared by Carl Gabrielson, in charge of the state motor vehicle department.

Quality of the 1922 wheat now being harvested in Umatilla county is better than was expected and much wheat in the lighter lands of the county is weighing up to No. 1 grade.

Declaring the Oregon corporation of the Shaker church to be fraudulent members of the Indian Shaker church at Chiloquin are seeking divorce from jurisdiction of the corporation.

A. C. Koeppen of Pendleton was elected president of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association in session in Roseburg, and Pendleton was selected as the site of the next convention.

First steps in the selection of a new president of Albany college, to succeed Dr. A. M. Williams, who announced his resignation last week, have been taken by the board of trustees.

A new resort for Clackamas county, situated on the banks of the Abernethy creek, about two miles from Oregon City, and to be known as Tamblin park, was opened to the public on Saturday night.

The campaign inaugurated several months ago by Albany college to obtain a fund for the erection of buildings on the new campus and also an increased endowment fund will be pushed actively this fall.

A union high school composed of three and a half districts has been organized by the district boundary board of Lincoln county. The high school includes lower Siletz bay and Devil's lake and Drift creek.

A fleet of six airplanes has been ordered to proceed from Crissy Field, Calif., for duty in forest fire patrol work in Oregon. The planes were detailed from the army air service at the requests of Oregon congressmen.

A resident of Wasco county for 59 years and a wagon train pioneer of Oregon, George R. Snipes, 90 years old, died at the family home near The Dalles, following an illness extending over a number of months.

Construction of a 20-mile road at a cost of \$10,000 to cut off miles of the distance between the Century drive and Davis, Odell and Crescent lakes, will be started at once, H. L. Plumb, Deschutes forest supervisor, states.

On account of the unusual season which has brought on both the cherry and the loganberry crop at the same time, pickers for these fruits are at a premium in Dallas. Many fruit growers are endeavoring to get their crops harvested short-handed and are working overtime in order to save the fruit, which ripens faster than it can be picked.
