Among the chambers of commerce cooperating with the Land Settlement is Salem which reports the names of 112 new settlers locating in and near Salem within the last six months. Other counties have also reported excellent results in their land settlement work.

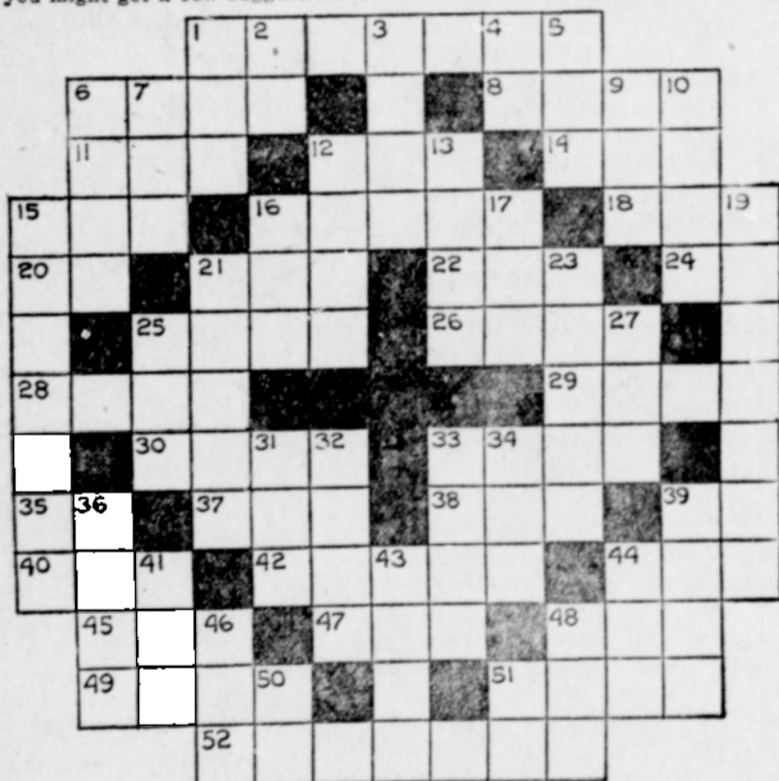

—one youthful and one very old—the Old and the New Year. In Derbyshire an old custom still prevails. At just twelve o'clock the doors are flung wide open and the New Year is ushered in with shouts of welcome.

There are places in England, also, where the Old Year is still swept out, according to an old custom. Men and boys with blackened faces and dressed to look like chimney sweeps, go through the streets with brooms, sweeping.

The practice of burning the Old Year out with huge bonfires still prevails in some places, while in many



districts it is rung out by muffled bells, and just at midnight the bells are un-muffled and the New Year is rung in with joyous peals.

But in no other country is the celebration of New Year's made so important a festival as in Japan. The streets and byways of Tokyo, as well as other cities, look like a vast playground. At a certain time in the day the emperor receives the princes and the princesses of the blood. At another hour all royalty and cabinet members and their wives. The scene is marked with great ceremony.

But all over the city the young people are having quite as good a time as royalty; a festival of pleasure is being held. Sometimes the faces are smudged with paint or ink—scarlet crepe, white silk and brilliant gold flit through all the streets. Very little religious ceremony is observed New Year's day, but upon the third of January the day is given over to worship in the palace, and upon the fourth of January the emperor opens the council chamber and state affairs are begun for the year.
