U. of O., Eugene. —Clinton Newton
Howard of Portland, a senior in the
University of Oregon school of Journal-
ism, is the winner of the 1925 Rhodes
scholarship in Oxford University for
the state of Oregon. He was chosen
Saturday in competition with seven
contestants, two from Reed college,
two from Willamette University, and
two besides himself from the University
of Oregon. The scholarship carries
with it a yearly stipend of \$1750, for
three years, beginning October, 1925,
and ending June, 1928.

Mr. Howard entered the University
in 1920, where his major interests have
been in journalism, in history, and in
literature. At Oxford he plans to read
in the Honour School of Modern History
His early training was received in the
Portland grade schools and Lincoln
High School.

At the University he has taken an
active part on the student publications,
the Oregon Daily Emerald and the
Lemon Punch, a humorous magazine.
Last year he was editor of the Sunday
Emerald. He is a member of Sigma
Delta Chi, national professional journal-
istic fraternity, and of Agora, a discus-
sion group. He has never competed
in intercollegiate athletics, although he
is a tennis enthusiast and a good swim-
mer. The summer of 1922 he spent in
San Francisco as a member of the
reportorial staff of the Chronicle.

Mr. Howard is the second University
of Oregon student to be chosen as
Rhodes scholar in two years. Arthur
Rosebraugh, of Salem, a graduate of the
Oregon law school was chosen last year
and is now studying at Oxford; and
Kerby S. Miller, selected for 1921, has
returned to the campus as instructor in
philosophy, after three years at Oxford.
