YOUR INCOME TAX

The exemptions under the revenue act of 1924 are \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,500 for married persons living together, and heads of families. In addition a \$400 credit is allowed for each person dependent upon and receiving his chief support from the taxpayer, if such a person is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective.

The normal tax rate under the revenue act of 1924 is 2 per cent on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the personal exemptions, credit for dependents, etc., 4 per cent on the next \$4,000, and 6 per cent on the balance. Under the preceding act the normal tax rate was 4 per cent on the first \$4,000 of net income above the exemptions and credits, and 8 per cent on the remaining net income.

The revenue act of 1924 contains a special provision for reduced taxes which did not appear in previous laws. All net income up to \$5,000 is considered "earned income." On this amount the taxpayer is entitled to a credit of 25 per cent of the amount of the tax.

For example, a tax payer, single and without dependents, may have received in 1924 a salary of \$2,000 and from a real estate transaction a profit of \$3,000. His total net income was \$5,000. Without the benefit of the 25 per cent reduction his tax would be \$80. His actual tax is \$60. From his net income of \$5,000 he is allowed a personal exemption of \$1,000; the tax of 2 per cent on the first \$4,000 is \$80, one-fourth of which, or \$20, may be deducted.

For the purpose of computing this credit, in no case is the earned net income considered to be in excess of \$10,000. A taxpayer may have received for the year 1924 a net income from salary of \$20,000, but the 25 per cent credit can be applied to only one-half of this amount.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON,

Eugene, Jan. 29th.—Special—The first complete topographic map of the Three Sisters region was completed this week by Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, professor of geology, and eight geology students of the University of Oregon. Dr. Hodge and his students spent six weeks in the Three Sisters region last summer obtaining topographic data. The map will be printed for distribution shortly to serve as a guide for those who visit the section.

The area covered was 16 by 12 miles. The scale of the map is one inch for 2000 feet and the contour interval is 100. The features on the map include a portion of the McKenzie highway, trails, mountain lakes, glaciers, and points of scenic and geologic interest.

"The Three Sisters region will some day be the playground of Oregon," said Dr. Hodge. "It views with Mt. Hood and Crater Lake in scenic importance and is easily accessible on the McKenzie Highway. Ancient and recent volcanoes, lava flows of a comparatively late date, 'glass' cliffs, a small crater lake, numerous small lakes and interesting mountain scenery are features that will draw an increasing number of tourists to this section each year."

Plans for conducting another government powder pool on a small scale are being formulated by The McMinnville National Bank. Six or eight thousand pounds of Pyrotol will be available and all persons interested should call at the earliest possible moment to place orders as the amount of powder in the present projected pool will be small.

Millions Of Cattle Wait For Tuberculin Test.

With 9,000,000 cattle already under supervision for the eradication of tuberculosis, veterinary officials of the United States Department of Agriculture and the various States are making efforts to meet the continued demands for additional testing. A summary of the status of the work up to December 1 shows a waiting list of 226,534 herds containing more than 2,500,000 cattle. This list represents applications for testing in 34 states, the others having been able to handle the testing as fast as requested.

The States which had "clear slates" in this respect at the time the summary was prepared were: Arkansas, Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, New Jersey, Oregon, Utah, Virginia, Washington, Wyoming, and the District of Columbia.

During November official veterinarians tested more than 50,000 herds or lots containing more than 600,000 cattle. Of this number, about 18,000 cattle reacted as tuberculous and were removed from the herds, thereby leading to the establishment of accredited herds and areas.
