Gave Names to Regions

Christian Endeavorers

Christian Endeavorers residing in Yamhill county have been invited to the rally to be held in the First Presbyterian church of Portland next Monday night, March 2, in honor of E. P. Gates of Boston, general secretary of the United Society of Christian Endeavor. Mr. Gates will be accompanied by Paul C. Brown of Los Angeles, Pacific Coast Christian Endeavor secretary.

Invitations announcing this rally have been sent to Christian Endeavorers residing in Dayton, Carlton, Amity, LaFayette, McMinnville and Newberg, and to other cities in the Willamette valley where Christian Endeavor work is in progress.

The Gates rally will be opened with a banquet at 6:15 o'clock, which will be followed at 7:30 p. m. with a mass meeting in the main auditorium of the church. Attention of Dayton Christian Endeavorers has been directed especially to the evening mass meeting, which will be public.

This will be the final visit of Mr. Gates to Oregon prior to the International Christian Endeavor Convention, which meets in Portland, July 4 to 10, 1925. Mr. Gates is now making a transcontinental tour, and is expected to tell at this rally the amount of interest he has found throughout the nation in the forthcoming International convention. Special recognition will be given Christian Endeavor delegates from outside of Portland attending the Gates rally, according to Judge Jacob Kanzler, general chairman of the International Convention Committee.

The keeping qualities of the Golden Delicious apple in western Oregon are being studied at the experiment station. In eastern Oregon this variety has proved one of the best. There it develops a good waxy cuticle, which has been found to add to the keeping quality of most varieties.

In the western part of the state, though it bears well, the fruit does not keep like the eastern product. However, the trees are still young, and the station hopes that as they become older the fruit will develop this waxing covering.

Varnish for Wall Paper

A home-furnishing suggestion is the use of varnish applied to wall paper. By this means it is said that the paper is preserved longer than ordinarily, and when necessary it can be cleaned with a damp cloth. The rather shiny finish might, however, prove a drawback.
