What are "Lightning Prints?"
 The Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture recently explained for a puzzled inquirer just what was meant by "lightning prints." After a person has been struck by lightning, it seems, especially when no serious injury is sustained, it is not uncommon to find somewhere on the patient's body ramifying pink marks, which generally disappear in the course of a day or two. These marks bear a general resemblance to trees or the venation of leaves, and were at one time supposed to be the photographic images of such objects, produced in some mysterious way by the lightning. It is now known, however, that these marks are not photographs, but are merely the lesions due to the passage through the tissues of a branching electrical discharge.

YOUR INCOME TAX
 NO. 8
 Losses incurred in a taxpayer's trade or business or profession or in "any transaction entered into for profit" not compensated for by insurance or otherwise are deductible from gross income upon which the income tax is assessed. To be allowed, losses not incurred in trade, business, or profession must conform closely to the wording of the statute. For example a loss incurred in the sale of a taxpayer's home or automobile, which at the time of purchase was not bought with the intention of resale, is not deductible because it was not a transaction "entered into for profit." Losses sustained in the operation of a farm as a business venture are deductible. If sustained in the operation of a farm operated merely for the pleasure of the taxpayer, they are not deductible.
 Broadcasting a complete commercial fertilizer is often advisable as soon as early vegetable ground can be plowed and harrowed. A formula suggested by the Oregon experiment station is: 3 to 4 per cent nitrogen, 8 per cent phosphoric acid, 6 per cent potash. This fertilizer would be made up of the following materials: 200 pounds of nitrate of soda, 300 to 400 pounds of superphosphate, 150 pounds of muriate or sulfate of potash. This mixture is broadcast over the ground for early garden in late February or early March. It is worked in with a spike tooth harrow. If desired 100 pounds of the nitrate of soda may be held for a top dressing later.
