### Farm Reminders

To avoid a rot which attacks vegetable seedlings in the spring, the careful Oregon gardener provides for the aeration of his hot beds. The large amount of damp weather in February and March is blamed by the experiment station for the spread of this disease, which causes the seedlings to rot when they are young.

Hot bed ashes are not allowed to cover up a bed of plants for any length of time without some aeration. Otherwise, water will condense on the under side of the sashes from the heat of the bed. This moisture dripping on the plants below, has a tendency to make them rot. Aeration prevents the water condensation.

Young vegetable plants, such as cabbage, lettuce, and tomatoes, are transplanted for the first time when they have shown their first true leaf, which is the third leaf. Some Oregon gardeners leave the plants in the seed bed too long before the first transplanting, the experiment station has observed. The plants become tall and spindling before they are removed to a place where they can begin to develop. The distance apart to place these young plants in the hot beds is 2 inches for lettuce and cabbage, and at least 4 inches by 4 inches for tomatoes.

If clover sod land which is to be used for potatoes is plowed early and shallow, the clover roots will have time to decay. The land can then be turned up deeper two or three weeks before planting. A 50 bushel increase to the acre with potatoes has been realized with this method in O. A. C. experiments.

After cultivation begins, the land that is wet and late can be easily recognized. Then is the most favorable time for designing farm drain systems. Wet land owners should make studies of ground, water and subsoil conditions and plan a drain system for the whole farm, advises the Oregon experiment station. The most necessary drains can be installed first and the whole system completed in units as time and means permit.

To get complete control of the peach leaf curl disease, it is necessary to spray so as to disinfect every bud on the tree. This spraying should be done while the buds are dormant. Bordaux 6-6-60 was found by the college experiment station to be satisfactory.
