News and Comment

"The site of the Original Settlement of Astoria."

"Erection of a fort was begun April 12, 1811, by the 33 members of the Astor party who sailed around Cape Horn in the ship Tonquin and established here the famous fur-trading post which was the first settlement west of the Rocky Mountains."

"Placed by the Astoria Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, October 6, 1924."

November 11, 1924. Armistice Day was observed at Salem by the unveiling of a soldiers' monument which was purchased with funds raised through a campaign conducted by the local branch of the American War Mothers. Chaplain W. S. Gilbert of the 162nd infantry was the principal speaker of the occasion.

The "Family Association of Mark and Susan Sawyer," pioneers of 1847, first organized about a year ago, held its second meeting August 24th at the home of Mrs. Eva Sawyer Smith, a short distance west of Wheatland, with sixty descendants present, besides a number of intimate friends and neighbors of the family. After a sumptuous dinner in a grove near by a business meeting was held and the officers chosen at the preliminary meeting were re-elected as follows: Ray L. Antrim, president; Nore Breidwell, vice-president; Ella M. Hendrick, secretary-treasurer. Then the entire company repaired to the site previously selected upon which has been placed a good sized boulder bearing a bronze tablet inscribed as follows: "In Memory of Mark and Susan Sawyer, Oregon Pioneers of 1847" This was located on the public highway running west from Wheatland at the half section line dividing the donation land claim of Mr. and Mrs. Sawyer. The company was then called to order, "America" was sung, prayer offered by the Rev. Mr. Blodgett, and the tablet was unveiled by Versa and Vestra Antrim, twin daughters of Hugh Antrim, and great-great-grandchildren to the pioneers to whom the tablet was thus dedicated. An appropriate reading by Miss Marian Hendrick was then given, followed with reminiscences by Mrs. Mary Robinson Gilkey, of Dayton, the first white girl-child born in Yamhill county, Mrs. Laura L. Kirchem, president of the John Bird Clan of Clackamas county, descendants of pioneers of 1847, and a brief address by George H. Himes, secretary of the Oregon Pioneer Association and Curator of the Oregon Historical Society.

Mark and Susan Sawyer left Lacon, Ill., in the spring of 1847 and arrived by way of the plains at Oregon City in September of that year.

Cities and Suburbs Must Be in Harmony

High taxes and land values in the cities have had the same effect on industry that they have had on home-seekers, they have forced industries to seek locations outside the city limits, where taxes and land are cheaper, but where the city's labor supply would be available. As a result, every big city not only has its residential suburbs, but its industrial suburbs. Essentially they are part of the city, actually they are not.

To bring all of these residential and industrial suburbs into some kind of harmony with the city about which they center is the task which regional-planning bodies in most of the big cities of the country are undertaking. The regional-plan idea recognizes the homogeneity of the entire city area—not merely that part within the city limits, but the suburbs and unorganized territory surrounding, and seeks to upbuild and regulate all parts for the benefit of the whole. Under regional-planning all local problems would be worked out in accordance with general plans and policies adopted by the region as a whole. Zoning bodies in the various communities would act in accordance with a general zoning plan for the whole area. Administrative bodies would act in accordance with a general program worked out to avoid conflicts and duplications of effort.—Chicago Daily News.
