Blue Grass and Redtop Are Best Lawn Mixtures

The lawn mixture giving best results
 in the Willamette valley is Kentucky
 blue grass 50 per cent and red top 50
 per cent. This is sown at the rate of
 one pound to 300 square feet. Clover is
 not recommended because it brauses,
 grows uneven, is difficult to mow, and
 has a yellow spotted appearance right
 after mowing. A further disadvantage
 is that it prevents effective spraying to
 kill moss infestations. The spray kills
 the clover with the moss, but does not
 injure the narrow blades of the grass.
 A mimeograph on the treatment of moss
 in lawns may be had by writing to the
 experiment station.
