### Farm Reminders

The average price to farmers for No. 1 Burbank potatoes on the Portland market for the last nine years has been about \$1.15 per bushel during October, November and December; an average of \$1.36 from January to April; and an average of \$1.80 during April and May, according to the O. A. C. extension service.

Large scale poultry keeping on one, two, and three tracts is a hazardous and generally short lived enterprise, according to H. E. Cosby, poultry specialist for Oregon extension service. Soil contamination with its attendant destructive diseases is almost sure to follow such system of management.

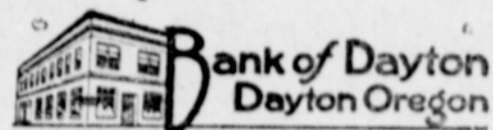
