### Chicks Want Free Range

Brooding chicks on clean soil and giving them free range following the brooding period is a wise practice, according to H. E. Cosby, poultry specialist for the O. A. C. extension service. A two, three or four yard system with the permanent brooder will permit ranging chicks on clean ground each year and will go far toward avoiding diseases that result from soil contamination, says Cosby. He asserts that brooding a large number of chicks on the same ground year after year and raising them to laying age on the same ground used for brooding is about the surest known method of going out of the poultry business.

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 2—(Special)—A marine biological station, the first in Oregon, will be established by the University of Oregon at Sunset Bay, three miles south of the entrance to Coos Bay on the coast, as part of the work of the summer session, June 22 to July 31. Plans have been completed for courses at Sunset Bay in elementary, advanced, and graduate marine zoology under the guidance of Dr. Harry B. Yocum, assistant professor of zoology.

"The site is extraordinarily well suited for the work of collecting,

identifying, and studying marine life," said Dr. Yocum, "as all sorts of conditions exist where marine animals live."

Cliff structures, exposed mud flats, sand dunes, and the immediate terrain at the station provide excellent opportunity for research. The site is fourteen miles from Marshfield. The instructional staff and students will occupy cottages at Sunset Bay at an attractive scenic spot.

The establishment of the station will be a great forward step in the survey of the animals of the Oregon coast. There is no other station in the Pacific Northwest with the exception of the University of Washington site at Friday Harbor, Wn., which has attracted biologists from all parts of the country. It is hoped by the Oregon staff that the development of work at Sunset Bay will prove equally attractive to scientists.

Ethel I. Sanborn, University instructor in botany, will conduct research work in paleobotany at the station during the summer session.

### The New Gold Cure For Tuberculosis

It is not remarkable that gold has been considered since remote antiquity to have curative qualities. Its rarity, its luster, and above all its incorruptibility, or in modern terms, its resistance to oxidation, make it the perfect metal. Many famous physicians have used gold in the attempt to cure disease.

The theoretical cure of a germ disease is simple. To effect it all we have to do is to find a substance that will kill the germ without killing the patient. Unfortunately, most disease germs cannot be destroyed in the patient's body without endangering the life of the patient. Up to the present time these efforts have reached their culmination in the brilliant results secured by Ehrlich and his co-workers in the use of arsenical compounds in syphilis and sleeping sickness. Compounds of antimony, bismuth and silver have also been found to be effective. A very large number of attempts have been made to poison the tubercle bacillus within the human and animal body.

In 1894 the gold cure had a run of popularity. The results were decidedly conflicting in regard to the value of gold as a curative agent, but it was definitely shown that gold compounds have a strongly inhibiting effect upon the growth of the bacillus of tuberculosis in the test tube. The most recent experiments on gold in tuberculosis are those coming from the laboratory of Prof. Holger Moelgaard in Copenhagen. He injects a gold compound which he calls "Sanocrysin", a double salt of gold and sodium thiosulphate. The salt is entirely harmless provided the tissues are healthy, a violent reaction, if they are tubercular. This severe reaction is a result of liberating large quantities of poison derived from the bacteria following their destruction by the gold salt. To counteract this injurious effect a horse serum is injected which has been prepared by injecting the blood of the horse with small quantities of dead tubercle bacilli over a long period of time. This specially prepared horse serum is believed to neutralize the poison coming from the gold-killed bacteria. The claims for "Sanocrysin" as a cure for tuberculosis have not been proven. This cure is still in the experimental stage and much work must be done before it can be given to the world as a reliable treatment for tuberculosis. Tubercular patients are advised not to place false hopes in the many highly exaggerated statements regarding the gold cures that have been made by various people.

In view of the serious danger involved in the use of gold compounds and in view of the extended study now being made, patients afflicted with tuberculosis are cautioned not to be unduly optimistic in regard to this treatment. No patient should discontinue the well known methods for the cure of tuberculosis by proper regulation of their lives with special emphasis upon REST, FOOD, and FRESH AIR under competent medical direction.
