Glen and Lloyd McFarlane were county seat visitors Saturday.

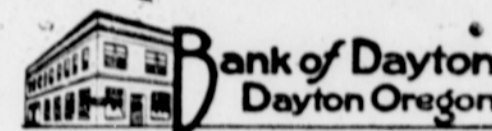
