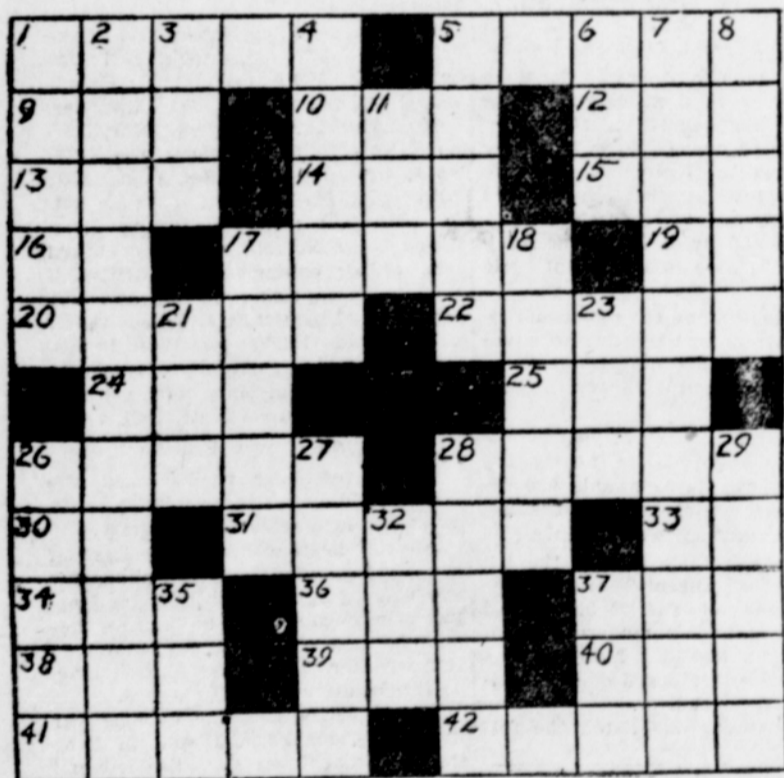

C., plans, with the help of hundreds of local committees, during the week of May 11 to 17, to open several hundred demonstration homes which will be model bettin homes.

The actual work in developing these demonstration homes is done by local committees who have been aided and guided in their work by bulletins and other written matter sent out from headquarters in Washington. These bulletins are compiled by some of the experts on housing in the country, so that if you can manage to visit a demonstration house, I am sure you will find good architecture, efficiency and beauty combined, and it will help you solve some of your own home-making problems.

Childrens Farm Home

The success and growth of the Childrens Farm Home should be of absorbing interest to every citizen of Oregon, to the child lover from a humanitarian viewpoint, to the tax payer from the economic. The Farm Home is the only non-sectarian institution in Oregon giving state wide service in the care of dependent children. Until its opening the outlook for the homeless child was dark indeed. Oregon had provided well for the boy or girl who had lost their innocence but left the child who was only homeless to face the world alone. There are in Oregon today hundreds of children who are totally without guardianship, whose feet have not strayed from the path of rectitude but many who will if not cared for soon become delinquent. It is well known to students of dependent and delinquency that when a child is thrust from one to another class the charge upon the state for the care is nearly quadrupled.

The Childrens Farm Home of the W. C. T. U. undertakes to give a real Christian home to dependent children to the full capacity of the cottages they are able to build with the funds entrusted to them and they will build as fast as these funds permit. There are at present three home cottages housing eighty one happy children on the beautiful farm near Corvallis. One more cottage is under construction and another will be built soon. These will not however provide for a tithe of the children for whom application is made.

We have appealed to every teacher, Sunday school superintendent and pastor in the state hoping to secure sufficient funds for an additional building. Mothers day offerings, entertainments etc. have been on for this purpose. The response has been better than last year but not enough to meet the need. The state appropriation for our school house will not quite equip it and the new cottage will require furnishing. We will be glad to respond to inquiries as to means and to furnish estimates for such definite help as our numerous friends may wish to give.

Womens clubs are vying with the W. C. T. U. in energetic support of the home while fraternities have been most generous and yet we are far from the goal of caring for every needy child in the state.

Several wills have named the Home on their bequests and we are grateful for this but we wish that more would give their money now and themselves see the happiness and safety that they will be the means of bringing to Gods little ones.

The Farm Home office at the Stock Exchange Bid'g in Portland is open every day in the week all day. Every one who reads this is invited to come in and ask all the questions they desire about the home and how the money is expended. Literature will be gladly furnished and personal help in raising funds freely given upon request.

Old Schoolhouse Now a Community Center

One little red schoolhouse in Vermont has been transformed into a lively center of community co-operation, according to the statement of the superintendent of schools in Poultney, made to the Interior department, bureau of education. This schoolhouse was lacking in attractiveness and in the conveniences and equipment needed by a modern rural school until 1922, when a parent-teacher association was organized. Things began to happen as soon as the men and women of the community became interested in the school. Money was raised for necessary equipment. Fourteen men with four teams in the school district had a "bee" one Saturday afternoon which resulted in regrading the school grounds. The people opened their homes and raised money in various ways for further improvements. The teacher co-operated with the women in their efforts to raise money.

The school is now rated a "standard school," but the Red Schoolhouse Parent-Teacher association will continue to work until a "superior" name plate has been placed on the building.
